## OU Receives Painting From Birmingham Man

A landscape "Timberline" by Detroit artist Richard Kozlow was donated to Oakland University, Rochester, last week by William J. Poplack, 511 Lake Park, Birmingham.

Kozlow gave the painting to Poplack in memory of the late Mrs. Poplack (Eleanor), who had been a patron of the arts. Poplack, in turn, donated his gift to the university.

OU Chancellor D. B. Varner extended the university's appreciation for the painting at a luncheon May 17 in the Meadowbrook Room on campus. He also spoke in memory of Mrs. Poplack.

THE PAINTING was hung temporarily in the Oakland University Art Gallery, where an exhibition of the university's permanent art collection remains on display through today.

Artist Kozlow, born in Detroit in 1926, studied at Cass Technical High School and the School of Arts and Crafts. He is represented in the collections of the Detroit Institute of Arts; Butler Institute, Youngstown, Ohio, and others.

He won the Founders' Society of Detroit Institute of Arts Purchase Prize in last year's Michigan Artists' Exhibition and, by virtue of winning that prize, is entitled to a one-man exhibition at the art institute this year.

## Openings Still Available for Summer Term

Karl Emmanuel, director of educational activities for The Community House, Birmingham, announced today that openings are still available in some of the summer classes being offered.

Study Skills Workshop is designed to help students make better grades so that entrance into college will be easier. The class is open only to those students who are presently enrolled in high school, or are going into high school in the fall, or college in the fall.

Emphasis is placed on how to make good use of time, taking class notes, reading more efficiently, learning to memorize, how to prepare for tests and the importance of good study habits.

THE INSTRUCTOR is Merrill Miller, a counselor at Seaholm High School. Films, lectures and reading assignments are all on the agenda. The class starts Monday, July 6, and runs for 10 consecutive weekdays, ending July 17. The time is 1-2:15 p.m. The fee includes books.

Youth painting, conducted by Virginia Schafer, will offer students help in basic drawing, subject orientation, and medium selection for the most effective results. Students can work in oils, water colors, or any other medium they select.

They will also be encouraged to try other media. The class meets Thursdays from 10:30 a.m.-12 noon for five weeks starting today. The fee for the course does not include supplies.

## Film Council Seeks Views Of Residents

The Birmingham Film Council has initiated a study to define what the community agrees to be "acceptable" and "unacceptable" film fare, according to Robert Williams, chairman of the steering committee.

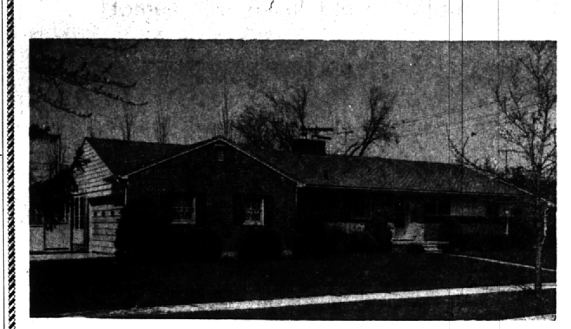
"Along with this," said Williams, "a study has been started to learn more about the problems faced by the film exhibitor in securing and programming films which are preferred by our community."

He said that in an effort to better define the problem which is their basic concern, a report is being prepared on the effect of films on youth. This will include the opinions of professional authorities associated with court and police investigation of youth delinquencies.

THESE PROJECTS were outlined in a bulletin issued by the film council, covering its first six months of activities.

Each church and school in the community is represented on the council by a member, usually a man and wife team. Their principal duties are to help form the council's policies and to secure cooperation of the group they represent in promoting the support of good films, the bulletin said.
