

Horse Show Pace Increases

Dressage Events Open Competition at BOH

The tempo reached a high pitch at the Bloomfield Open Hunt today as riders and horses prepared for the final four days of the big Detroit Horse Show.

The show began Monday night with trophies being awarded in dressage events and will conclude Sunday night as jumpers take over the spotlight.

The Fort Riley Classic, a new glamorous jumping event will be featured Saturday at 9 p.m. The winner of the competition will receive the Francis Hopkins Duffy Memorial Trophy, named in honor of the late club member, along with a \$1,000 check.

Competitors had to complete a five-minute compulsory test and a five-minute free-style test.

Miss Newberry also placed second in the event on Colpin. The former U. S. Olympic rider in the 1960 Rome Games took high honors in the F.E.I. Prix St. Georges class aboard My Authority, also. She again grabbed second on Colpin.

A Birmingham rider, James Jones, finished third in the Kits competition on his mount, Miss Prince. Barbara McGuiness of Toronto was third in Class E.

ALISON CRAM of Birmingham pulled down a second place in Class A dressage, finishing behind Michael Kierkegaard of Washington, D. C., who rode The Bachelor. Miss Cran entered the event on Sonntag, Chris Jones of Bloomfield Hills followed Alison in third place. She rode Mood Indigo.

Two local riders also placed in Class B dressage. Richard Schuster of Birmingham, on Coal Schock, placed behind Natalie Pawlenko, the class winner. Pam Evans of Bloomfield Hills finished third, riding Commando.

In Class C, Michael Kierkegaard captured his second championship, again on The Bachelor. He was awarded first place over Trudy Peterson and Dr. Helga Laufenstein.

Rosemary Herman of Dearborn rode Stormy Steady to victory in Class D, while Molly Mason was second and Dr. Helga Laufenstein third.

CHILDREN'S classes and junior exhibitors took over the ring on Tuesday as junior hunters competed against one another. The junior jumpers are slated to finish up tonight and Friday. Hunter classes will continue through Sunday.

Teams of hunters are scheduled for 9 a.m. today and again at 7:30 tonight. Hunter stakes will begin Saturday evening and wind up on Sunday.

Championship awards for green and open jumpers will begin at 4 p.m. Sunday and also take place at 10 p.m.

Hills Golfer Wins 3rd Cup

For the second year in a row Mrs. C. P. (Phyllis) Mehas of Bloomfield Hills won the Pine Lake Country Club Women's President Cup Tournament Friday.

Mrs. Mehas handed in a total net score of 222 for 54 holes in the three-day event, including a final round of 87.

THE VICTORY was the third in the past six years for Mrs. Mehas, who won the President's Cup for the first time in 1959. In second place in the tourney,

five strokes behind the winner, was Mrs. James H. Youngblood of Bloomfield Hills. She shot a 54-hole total of 227.

Mrs. Blenn A. MacKellar of Birmingham, the PLCC golf chairwoman, registered a 237 score, good for third place.

In fourth place in the annual tourney was Mrs. Gilbert Hauser of Bloomfield Hills with 240, while Mrs. Albert W. Holcomb placed fifth with a net total of 241. She is from Birmingham.

MRS. MEHAS, who carries a handicap of 14, fired an opening round score of 89 and then got better as the tournament progressed. She carried an 88 in the second round to go along with her final outing of 87.

Mrs. Youngblood, the runnerup, shot 114 for the first 18, dropped to 103 in the middle stanza, then climbed to 109 in the final. She has a 33 handicap.

The third-place finisher, Mrs. MacKellar, put in a serious threat in the middle round. A 16-handicapper, she totaled 97 at the start, but then turned in an 88 for a 72 net. She climbed to a final round of 100, or 84 net.

The champion's three net scores for the tournament were 75, 74, 73. Mrs. Youngblood had a 70 net for the second 18 holes.

THE PINE LAKE tourney was instigated in 1937 and was known as the Hatch Tournament, in honor of the late Clarence Hatch, one-time club member. The name was changed in 1959, when the new cup was obtained. Winner is determined on a low net basis.

Era Ends at Bloomfield: Hoff Drops Football Post

A familiar figure will be absent from the sidelines at Bloomfield Hills football games this far—one that has been present for eight years.

Don Hoff, Baron athletic director, track coach and football mentor, has announced that he will forsake the latter position to devote full time to the other two. He has been athletic director since 1956.

His successor on the football field will be Bill Tunniff, 24, the one-time University of Michigan fullback.

TUNNICLIFF played for the Wolverines from 1959-61 averaging 4.1 Jackson High for 1 1/2 years and also taught at Ann Arbor High.

He graduated from Michigan in 1965 with a B.A. in history and social studies. He has coached at Jackson High for 1 1/2 years and also taught at Ann Arbor High.

Tunniff signed a contract with Bloomfield on June 17. He is married and has no children. He starred as a fullback for Ferris State, James and was named to the All-Country Class C unit in 1957.

The school administration relieved Hoff of his gridiron assignment at his own request. The planned expansion of school athletic facilities would add to Hoff's responsibilities as athletic director and prompted the board to act.

THE RECENTLY approved bond issue of \$7,670,000 by voters in Bloomfield Hills will help finance a four-year building program in the area.

The plans call for a seven-lane swimming pool, tennis courts at East Hills and Bloomfield Hills junior high schools and tracks at both of the two junior highs.

Hoff got the most out of his

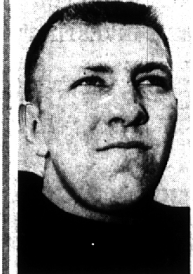

The Carling event is the only championship in any individual sport open to players from throughout the world.

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
