State Hunters To Set Sights On Elk Herds

Resident sportsmen can now look forward to Michigan's first elk hunting season in modern times. Setting regulations under authority given to it by the State Legislature, the Conservation Commission approved a conservative Dec. 5-15 season which will be controlled on an area and kill quota basis for taking about 200 surplus elk from a herd of 3,500.

Some 300 Michigan hunters will get a chance to stalk these antlered giants which were last hunted in the state nearly 100 years ago.

THEIR SHOOTING boundaries will ring five foot-shootage and crop-damage areas covering most of the herd's 600-square-mile range in parts of Cheboygan, Presque Isle, Otsego and Montmorency counties.

Elk of either sex will be legal targets in four of these areas. Hunting in the remaining, central area will be restricted to antlerless animals with the thought of maintaining its bull population as a tourist attraction.

Weapon regulations call for high-powered rifles larger than 23 caliber which pack at least 1,000 foot-pounds of energy at 100 yards, using bullets that weigh 100 grains or more.

Successful hunters will be required to bring their elk to the Department's Pigeon River Trout Research Station so the animals can be checked by game biologists.
