B'ham Realtor To Develop Community

Birmingham realtor Howard T. Keating announced plans this week for a \$250 million development in northern Oakland County.

Keating's firm has purchased the estate of the late William E. Scripps in Orion Township. Keating plans to build a community for 35,000 persons on the 3,200-acre site.

The new community will be known as Keatington. It will include houses, apartment, a golf course, a light industrial tract, shopping center and a marina on Woodhull Lake.

KEATING SAID it will take about 10 years to develop the property. He said houses will be in the low \$30,000 price range and models will go on display in the fall.

The property is located southwest of Lake Orion, about 1 1/2 miles north of the I-75 Freeway and west of M-24. It is 35 miles from Detroit and 30 miles from Flint.

The Keating firm was established by the late Howard Keating Sr. and has developed many subdivisions in the Birmingham, Bloomfield area and in Florida.

THE COMPANY recently purchased the old Birmingham Masonic Temple at Woodward and Forest and will use it as their main office.

The new community was planned by Donald Geake. His plans call for the retention of trees and natural ground terrain wherever possible.

Moore Seeks Election To County Circuit Bench

Circuit Judge Arthur E. Moore announced his candidacy for election to the office of circuit judge of Oakland County. He was appointed to the office by Gov. Romney in February 1963. Prior to that date, he served continuously as probate judge from 1938 to 1963.

Judge Moore is a graduate of the University of Michigan Law School and Literature School. He was one of the founders and is now president of the Oakland County Club and was likewise the first president of the Pontiac Boy's Club.

HE HAS served as director of the Michigan Children's Aid Society and Oakand County Child Guidance Clinic and was formerly a presiding judge of the probate courts, president of the Juvenile Court Judges' Association.

In the spring of 1964, he was appointed executive judge of the seven Oakland County circuit courts. In this capacity he is responsible for the administrative affairs of the courts having to do with budget, probation work and marriage conciliation services of the court.

car on the same side of the highway.

"There is the possibility of a car glancing off the rail," said Barney Cyberski, roadway improvement and capital engineer. "But a professional driver can usually bring his car under control."

CYBERSKI ADDED that side-swiping another vehicle is not as serious as a head-on collision.

He said the guard rail, a double steel beam about 18 inches high, would be installed within 45 to 60 days.

"At that time all left turns will be prohibited from Telegraph into both the Foxcroft subdivision and Foxcroft apartment sites.

Levine said he had had about 15 calls from subdivision residents during the past week objecting to removal of the concrete median from fear that left turns would be prohibited.

He told Dehne that he would issue a work order to the Oakland County Road Commission for the installation of the guard rail.

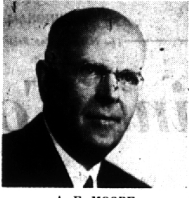
Warrants Issued For Two men in Greenfield Holdup

Bloomfield Hills police said Mrs. Donaldson was going east on Long Lake when she lost control of her vehicle and struck the Grand Trunk Railroad viaduct. She told police she "blacked out."
