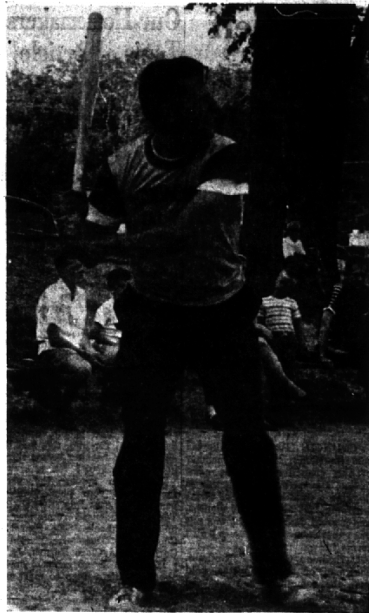

### Amateur Radio Operators Drill For Emergency

The Birmingham amateur radio club, known officially as Catalpa Amateur Radio Society (CARS), conducted an emergency communications drill June 27 and 28, in conjunction with amateur radio operators all over the country.

The purpose of this drill is to make certain that the local amateurs can supply communications in the event of a natural disaster, such as the recent earthquakes in Alaska.

**DURING THE** 24 hour period of the drill, no commercial power is permitted. All power must be supplied by portable power units just as might be the case in the event of a power failure in an emergency.

The emergency drill is operated each year toward the end of June. This year the local club had stations set up in Dodge Park number five on Beverly Road. The club operated nearly a dozen stations continuously from 4 p.m. Saturday through 4 p.m. Sunday.

**EACH CLUB** is given points for the number of other stations it contacts. For the past several years the local club has scored in the top ten throughout the country and two years ago they came in second.

## B'ham Rotarians Observe Club's 40th Anniversary

Birmingham Rotarians observed the 40th anniversary of the founding of their club Monday.

George R. Averill, the club's first president, spoke of the early days of Birmingham and outlined the club's beginnings.

Averill, former editor and publisher of The Eclectic, was introduced by F. Ward Ouradnik, administrative director of the paper.

Averill introduced the other speakers on the day's program, who dealt with the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self" and the maxim that "he profits most who serves best."

Averill, Vliet and Randall are the last of the club's charter members.

Vliet said that when he came to Birmingham in 1915 it had already started "the change to a suburb of Detroit as it is today."

He cited Rotary's attention to programs for crippled children and its interest in The Community House.

"I hope the club in the future will maintain its interest in The Community House as a community project."

Rotary's luncheon meetings are held three each Monday.

VLIET SAID his "only regret is that I am not so close to the younger members" and noted that the charter members now only number three.

Randall spoke on his recollections of the people and organizations of Birmingham's early days.

Kilpatrick described the "educational fun" that derives from communication with fellow Rotarians and spoke of the Rotarians' desire "to contribute to the betterment of mankind."

Averill also introduced Dr. George P. Raynale, one of six members who joined the Rotary Club shortly after it received its charter on May 21, 1924.
