

Fire Destroys Township Garage; Loss Is \$5,500

An old barn, converted into a garage, at 3767 W. Maple, Bloomfield Township, was destroyed by fire early Monday morning. Loss was estimated at \$5,500. Township firemen, alerted at 1:55 a.m., soon brought the blaze under control but not before the fire had

destroyed the garage and blistered the paint on a nearby house, both owned by Dean Russell, Jr. Firemen were called by a passing motorist. Chief Volvy V. Yanzuski estimated that \$2,500 of the total loss was to contents of the garage.

Lathrup Rubbish Contract Awarded To B'ham Firm

A Birmingham disposal service has been granted two rubbish pickup contracts by the Lathrup City Council.

GCW Disposal Service, 1244 Cole, was lower of two bidders on two separate contracts that will extend rubbish collections in Lathrup from twice a month to weekly, as allocated in the city's new budget.

WEEKLY RUBBISH pickups began yesterday, start of the new fiscal year. The first contract, which will run until Sept. 15 when the present bi-monthly contract ends, will cost the city \$1,165. The firm was also awarded a new two-year contract starting Sept. 15 for \$10,214 with a one-year renewal option.

The two-year contract is based on a charge of 76 cents per unit per month, two cents lower than the other bid.



JUDGE QUINN

Circuit Judge Candidate for Appeals Court

Timothy C. Quinn, circuit judge for Lapeer and Tuscola Counties, is a candidate for the new state Court of Appeals established by the new Constitution. He will run in the second district, which includes 16 southeastern Michigan counties, but not Wayne.

Quinn, 58, has been circuit judge since 1953. Before that he was the Republican prosecuting attorney of Tuscola County. He lives in Caro, has 5 children and is a University of Michigan graduate.

If he wins the race, Quinn will resign as circuit judge Jan. 1.

UNDER THE new Constitution, a Court of Appeals with three districts and three judges in each district is created. These district courts will hear appeals from Circuit Court.

Candidates will run on a non-partisan ballot. The 6 getting the most votes in the Sept. 1 primary will run in the Nov. 3 general election.

The candidate getting the most votes in the general election will get a 10 year term. The runner-up will get an 8-year term and the third a 6-year term. After these terms expire, all terms will be for 6 years. The salary is \$23,000 a year.

THE 16 counties in this district are Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac, St. Clair, Lapeer, Macomb, Oakland, Genesee, Shiawassee, Livingston, Ingham, Jackson, Hillsdale, Lenawee, Washtenaw and Monroe.

No other candidates from the Thumb have announced. Candidates from other counties include 2 circuit judges and a state senator. The judges are Howard Carroll of Macomb and Louis McGreggor of Genesee. The senator is Farrell Roberts, a Pontiac attorney.
