B'ham Boy Attends University Institute

Robert Henry Dobson, 31410 Evergreen, Birmingham, is among 15 superior high school students selected to attend a National Science Foundation-sponsored mathematics institute at Emory University.

The students were selected from 150 applicants. Emory mathematician Dr. John W. Neuberger said they will go to special lectures at the college level and even into parts of advanced calculus.

"The classes are more like a seminar than a lecture class," he says. "We divide them into small groups of five where they get special instruction and an opportunity for much discussion." There is very little straight lecturing. The classes are for a five-week period ending July 17.

CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ORDINANCE NO. 415

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CITY CODE BY PROVIDING A LICENSE FEE FOR THE OPERATION OF CIGARETTE VENDING MACHINES.

The City of Birmingham Ordinance, Title VII of the City Code is amended by adding thereto the following Chapter:

CHAPTER 45 CIGARETTE VENDING MACHINES.
 2.33. License Fee. In determining the fee of this chapter the following definition shall apply:
 (1) Cigarette Vending Machine. Cigarette vending machine shall mean any automatic vending machine which is a wholly or in part for the sale of cigarettes and controlled by the insertion of money, coins, or tokens.
 2.33. License Required. No person shall keep, display, maintain, authorize, or permit public access to any cigarette vending machine on any premises in his possession or under his control without first obtaining a license therefor from the City of Birmingham. Such license shall be granted upon application setting forth the identification of each such machine and its proposed location and upon payment of license fee, provided, the Chief of Police certifies his approval of the proposed location of each machine subject to proper control and law enforcement. Each cigarette vending machine must have a license. The fee for such license shall be as prescribed in Chapter 46, and all such licenses shall be subject to suspension and revocation in the manner prescribed in Chapter 49.
 2.33. Attachment to Machine. If the license application is approved, the City Clerk shall issue a license which shall be attached to the machine so that it is open to inspection at all times.
 Transfer of License. License issued hereunder may be transferred from one machine to another at the same location upon application to the City Clerk, identifying the machine to be so licensed. License issued hereunder may not be transferred from one applicant of license to another.
 2.33. Operation by Minors. No person, whether or not licensed hereunder, shall permit the operation of any cigarette vending machine under his custody and control by any minor under the age of twenty-one (21) years, or by any person in violation of any ordinance, statute or Federal law.
 2.33. Seizure of Machine. If the Chief of Police determines that any cigarette vending machine is being used contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, and that effective enforcement of this ordinance so requires, he may seize or cause to be seized such machine and it can be released only in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, upon payment of inspection and storage expenses incurred by the City.

City Advised Not to Condemn W. Maple Lots

Attorney Dean G. Beier has advised Birmingham commissioners that he does not believe the city can condemn property to prevent its use for commercial purposes.

Commissioners had asked for an opinion regarding the possibility of condemning five lots owned by Mr. and Mrs. Manley Bailey and Mrs. Elinor Haack on W. Maple near Larchdale.

The property is presently zoned for business. The Birmingham Plan Board had recommended the land be rezoned to residential as did the residents of the area.

THE PROPERTY owners had objected to the rezoning and commissioners upheld the business classification after a public hearing on June 18.

The commission had proposed condemning the property, pay for it and then sell it with some kind of limitation on its use for commercial purposes.

Beier said in his opinion that it was "fundamental to any condemnation proceeding that necessity for taking must be predicated on public use and not merely on public benefit or public welfare."

It would probably be impossible for us to show any need for public use connected with the proposed taking, since the suggestion involves disposing of the property to private persons to be used for private purposes."

BEIER SAID enabling acts provide the City with power to condemn to remove nonconforming uses but do not provide that zoning to a desired use may be accomplished by condemnation and resale.

Under slab clearance legislation, property may be acquired by condemnation and resold to private parties; but the courts have held that slab clearance is in itself a public use justifying the power of eminent domain," Beier said.

He said it was his opinion that the "public use" ingredient necessary for condemnation action could not be shown in regard to the Bailey property.

Commissioners instructed the administration to look into the possibility of negotiating for the land.

School Board Approves 2 Budgets for '64-'65'

The county school board adopted two budgets — general education and special education — June 25 for the 1964-'65 school year.

The special education budget of \$1,510,431 is \$135,695 lower than last year's budget. Special education is financed through a half mill levied across the county.

THIS NEW BUDGET incorporates a balance of \$968,565 on July 1 of this year. Total income estimated for the next school year is \$1,688,147, whereas the estimate for expenditures is \$1,510,431, leaving a balance next year of \$177,716.

The special education budget includes a raise in the administration fund of nearly \$13,000 for remodeling the county school building.

authorized Supt. William J. Emerson to proceed in negotiations to have the computer room remodeled for the addition of a classroom to teach data processing.

Other office space in the County Service Center building will be altered to install a new test room for the testing of hearing in students. The cost of the remodeling was put at \$18,735 by an architect.

THE COUNTY SCHOOL board passed a general education budget for 1964-'65 of \$967,029, an increase of \$79,888 over last year.

The general budget anticipates a balance this July 1 of \$70,268 and a similar balance of \$59,298 on July 1 of next year. Revenue for the year is estimated at \$416,297.

SALARIES JUMP \$40,243 in the new general education budget accounting for four added staff positions.

Professional services rise \$5,483 from last year. This incorporates increased use of outside consultants for inservice teacher training and conferences, increased use of data processing and a new educational research department — systematic studies.

Circuit Judge James S. Thorburn is announcing his candidacy for the Oakland County Circuit Judge election Nov. 3.

Appointed a circuit judge by Gov. George Romney, Judge Thorburn has served as one of Oakland County's seven circuit judges since Sept. 6, 1963.

Judge Thorburn was elected to three terms and served for twelve years as trustee, vice-president and president of the Royal Oak School Board prior to his appointment as circuit judge.

HE PRACTICED law in the Oakland County courts for 16 years prior to ascending the bench. As city attorney for the cities of Pleasant Ridge and Huntington Woods, and as attorney for the Birmingham School District, Judge Thorburn was a frequent participant in public law litigation in his private practice.

Judge Thorburn is a past president of the Oakland County Bar Association and also the South Oakland Bar Association.
