

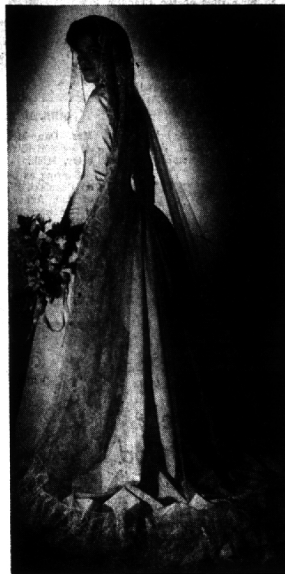
Repeat Marriage Vows
