Harry A. McDonald

Harry A. McDonald, 70, of Washington, D.C., formerly of Detroit, died July 2 in his Washington home. He was the father of Harry A. McDonald, Jr., of Bloomfield Hills.

In 1923, Mr. McDonald came to Detroit as a dairy company executive and in 1934 founded his own company, the H. A. McDonald Creamery and Dairy, in investment banking firms. He was active in Masonic organizations, the American Legion and Detroit Board of Commerce. He was a past potentate of Moslem Temple Shrine.

Mr. McDonald became the first Republican member of the SEC and in 1951 was appointed administrator of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC) by President Truman. He supervised the merger of the RFC with the Small Business Administration, ending his government service in 1953.

Since then he lived in Washington supervising personal interests and serving as president of Allied Capital Corp., the first publicly held small business investment company. Last week he announced he had become, in association with his son, a limited partner of Manley, Bennett McDonald & Co., Detroit and Bloomfield Hills securities brokerage firm.

In addition to his son, Mr. McDonald is survived by his wife, Ora Lee.

out but a full report of the child's progress is sent to the parent and the Washington teaching staff.

Beginning in September, Corliss said, a remedial program would be introduced into the regular school program.

ANOTHER course being offered this summer is reading readiness.

"Although they have all completed kindergarten we felt they had not quite reached the reading level they should have," Corliss said.

"This class is in no way a reflection that the parents have not done their job; we are just better equipped to help these children," he said.

The third course is a reading improvement program being taught only to 5th and 6th graders.

"This is an enrichment course for youngsters who are reading at their own level and above.

"WE STRESS vocabulary growth, use of reference books, drama, report writing and general reading improvement," Corliss said.

"They discuss and inspect many prints by some of the artists and attempt a critical analysis both in regard to the prints and to their own art work," he said.

The goal of the class, Corliss said, is to give the youngsters an opportunity to add to their own creative experiences as well as giving them a greater appreciation of the entire field of the arts.
