

Seaholm to Host 3rd Career Day

The Birmingham Rotary Club will sponsor its annual Career Day on Nov. 26, chairman Clarence Kraft announced today.

The event this year will be held at Seaholm High School and will involve 2,000 students.

On Career Day, the Rotarians furnish consultants from various vocational-occupational fields to discuss with the students the requirements and rewards for their specific fields.

Last year, it took place at Groves School, and the year before, when the program was initiated, it was held at Seaholm. It will rotate between the two schools from year to year.

PRECEDING CAREER Day will be a kick-off presentation at a school assembly on Sept. 23, with keynote speaker to stimulate the students to thinking about careers.

Consultants will be chosen from fields to be determined through a questionnaire to be distributed among students early in the school term.

The discussion sessions between students and counselors will be held at the school on Nov. 22 and will conclude with a summarization by the Rotarians at a noon luncheon meeting at The Community House. Consultants will be guests at that luncheon.
