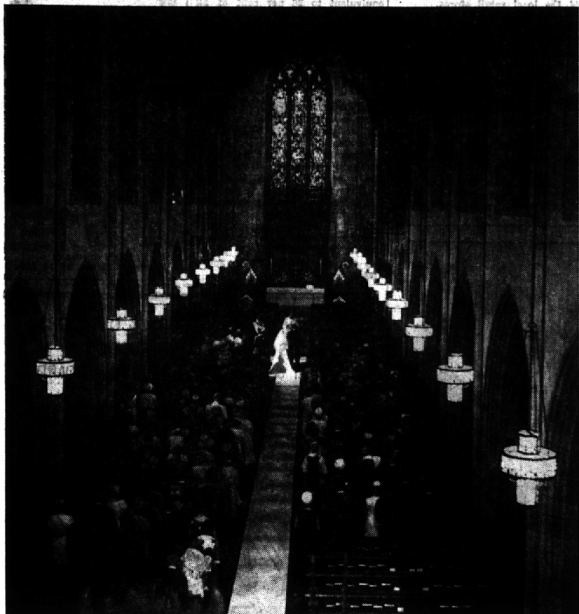

## Presbyterian Women Attend Conference

Mrs. Lindsey Stout, Jr., 16275 Mainline, Mrs. John C. Hovis, 31700 Bolivine Trail, and Mrs. Arthur Brookman, 2420 Broadway, of First Presbyterian Church were among 5,000 United Presbyterian Women who gathered at Purdue University from June 22 to June 27 to confer Christian freedom.

Meeting in their triennial assembly the United Presbyterian Women heard from leading churchmen and met with special guests and delegates from overseas. They launched study and action themes for the next three years which will be taken up locally by the 626,000 members of United Presbyterian Women.

UNDER THE theme "Called to be Free and Obedient" the women considered what real Christian freedom means in relationship to oneself and to others.

Special music was provided by a large choir of United Presbyterian Women, the Princeton Theological Seminary Choir and the Octet from Inter-American University of Puerto Rico. Helen Kromer, noted religious dramatist, presented a play she had written especially for the meeting, as well as other dramatic presentations.

Noted speakers on different aspects of the theme included Dr. Ernest Gordon, Dean of Chapel at Princeton University; the Rev. Eugene Carson Blake, Stated Clerk of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.; Dr. Paul Pruyser, Director of the Education Department of the Menninger Foundation, Topeka, Kansas; and Mrs. Abbey C. Jackson, National President of the Women's Home Foreign Missionary Society of the A.M.E. Zion Church.

REPORTS OF accomplishments and failures were presented as well as future emphases for United Presbyterian Women.

The Reverend Dr. Gene E. Bartlett, President, Colgate Rochester Divinity School, Rochester, N.Y., will be in the Kirk pulpit August 30.

Dr. Bartlett has been pastor of Baptist Churches in Evanston, Ill., Los Angeles and Syracuse, N. Y., and is nationally known as an author, lecturer and preacher.

The final preacher in the summer series at Kirk in the Hills will be the Reverend Dr. Roy Pearson, Dean, Andover Newton Theological School and President, Andover Theological Seminary, Newton Centre, Mass. He will be in the Kirk pulpit September 6.

DR. PEARSON is the author of a number of books and a regular contributor to various magazines and periodicals. He won the Churchman's Award for "The Sermon of the Year."

The Reverend Dr. Harold C. DeWindt, minister of the Kirk in the Hills, will return to his pulpit September 13, following his vacation.
