15 YEARS AGO July 7, 1949 The Michigan Bell Telephone Company this week announced a \$14,500 expansion of the local switchboard to help provide service to priority applications pending the inauguration of Birmingham's new \$2,250,000 dial system next summer. Walter B. Fausser, manager here for the company, said the expansion project was the major item on a carefully planned program to gain additional switchboard facilities. A 14-page off-street parking report was formally accepted by the city commission Monday night and preliminary steps were authorized for placing the matter before the voters at a subsequent election. The report suggests an expenditure of \$25,505 for three municipal parking lots in the downtown area which would provide space for 860 cars. The program would be financed 72 percent by parking meter revenues over the next 20 years. Fire and accident damaged the heels of the Bloomfield Township fire department last week Wednesday afternoon as they responded to an alarm at the home of R. Jamison Williams, 1029 Yarmouth road. As the driver of the truck attempted to make a left turn from Telegraph road to Maple, he lost control of the machine which tipped over. The 16 churches within Birmingham's city limits have played a major role in the community's social, moral and religious activities. First Baptist women hold an annual scholarship tea and style show. The Congregational Church of Birmingham works with the Pontiac Urban League, aids the blood bank and has a vacation Bible school, while Embury Methodist has a new sanctuary planned, holds a father-son and mother-daughter banquet, a youth nautical supper and a daily vacation school. Redeemer Lutheran sponsors a youth chapel-dinner, holds a toy collection for underprivileged children and sponsors two rummage sales, while Our Shepherd Lutheran operates the only Protestant grade school in Birmingham.

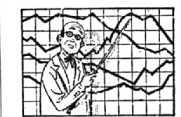
