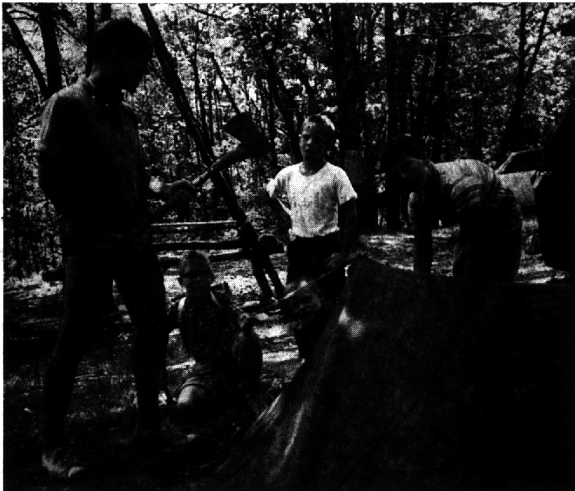
### It's an Old Familiar Fun Formula

When Lisa Gae Knudsen walks up the aisle of Christ Church Cranbrook this afternoon to become the bride of Henry Howard Flint III, the ceremony will further cement a friendship which began three generations ago in Detroit's North End.

Lisa's paternal grandparents, the late Gen. and Mrs. William S. Knudsen (he was one-time president of General Motors Corp. and a vital cog at the Pentagon in World War II), and Mr. and Mrs. Howard Flint, grandparents of the bridegroom-elect (prominent business-wise, civically and socially), first became acquainted when their respective sons attended Detroit County Day School.

The two families' lives have been intertwined ever since, culminating in today's 4 o'clock service during which the Semon E. Knudsen's second daughter will repeat her nuptial vows to the Edgar B. Flint's oldest son. The Flint family all lives in Bloomfield Hills now.

The Rev. John H. Albrecht will read the service before an altar holding vases of majestic white lilies, after which a reception will be given in the Knudsen home on Bingham Road.

### Dream Come True

Like most little girls when they're growing up, Lisa's sorties into the world of fantasy frequently involved "dressing up"—with mom's wedding gown invariably her favorite costume. Hence, when she appears this afternoon it will be in a replica—executed by New York's Dorothy Dickerson—of the frothy confection worn by Mrs. Knudsen at the time of her marriage.

The bodice and long sleeved bolero, buttoned to the waistline, is of white Chantilly lace, the same lace used in the skirt of double white silk marquisette which extends into a long court train. Her tulle veil will be secured to a Juliette cap of pleated Chantilly, and she will carry an old-fashioned arrangement of lilies of the valley.

### In the Wedding Party

Mrs. Howard S. Christie, Jr., (Judy Knudsen) of Buffalo, N.Y., will be her sister's matron of honor, and another sister, Kristina, will be maid of honor.

Bridesmaids include Marilyn Flint, sister of the bridegroom-elect; Mrs. William E. Briggs of Bloomfield Hills; Maria Kountoupes of Detroit; Karen Palo of Lake Linden, Mich.; and Karen VanderKloot of Bloomfield Hills, cousin of the bride.

They will all be dressed in yellow and white. The short skirts of white double silk organza, appliqued on the under layer with yellow-centered daisies, are topped by bodices of yellow silk linen. They will wear Chanel bows of yellow in their hair and carry loose arrangements of daisies.

Mrs. Knudsen will greet guests wearing an original designed coat and dress ensemble of lime green chiffon

mounted over lime silk crepe. The simple lines of the dress are accented by a gathered neckline and the matching, full-length coat of chiffon is slit on the sides. A lime green chiffon draped turban of matching fabric completes her costume.

### Gardens A-Bloom

Guests attending the garden reception will have an opportunity to see the Knudsen grounds at the height of their bloom—only other decorations to include the marquee erected on the lawn containing individual tables covered by yellow and white striped clothes. Centerpieces will be quaint Dutch baskets filled with arrangements of multi-colored garden flowers surrounded by votive lights.

On the bridal table will be an arrangement of white garden flowers accented by garlands of simlax and daisies, which will also surround the wedding cake.

Immediately following the reception, the couple will leave on a trip to San Juan, Puerto Rico, after which they will make their home on Concord Place Drive, Bloomfield Hills.

For traveling the bride will wear a sleeveless white suit with slim skirt of bubble pique, a blue tucked organza

blouse and ascot tie. Completing the costume will be her blue silk organza headband.
