## Tour Features Indian Pueblo

Jane Linder, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Linder of 1200 Chesterfield, Birmingham, visited Santo Domingo, the world's largest Indian pueblo, north of Albuquerque, N. M., this week.

Inside the pueblo, she found another world where 1,800 Indians practice the beliefs and rituals observed by their forefathers long before Columbus discovered America.

She also toured the old Santo Domingo Mission which contains furnishings and records dating back to 1605. The venerable structure was originally built 16 years before the Pilgrims landed on Plymouth Rock.

Santo Domingo is believed to be one of the "Seven Cities of Cibola", sought by Coronado when he first explored the area in 1504. Instead of being cities of gold, they were seven pueblos of adobe mud which reflect rich amber in the light of the dying sun.
