

Reception to Honor Visitors from India

A reception for Mr. and Mrs. Homi Sethna of India will be held from 7 to 10 p.m. Friday at the Bloomfield Art Association, 1516 S. Cranbrook Road, Birmingham.

An exhibition of textiles by Mrs. (Nellie Mehta) Sethna, who was a student at Cranbrook Academy of Art in 1958, will open Friday and continue through July 19.

Her husband, a film maker, will show his slides of Indian crafts, folk dancing and Indian architecture at 8:30 p.m. during the reception.

A showing of documentary films by Sethna on various aspects of Indian life and culture is slated for 8 p.m. July 17. The reception and film and slide programs are open to the public.

THE SETHNAS have come to Birmingham following their participation as delegates to the First World Congress of Craftsmen June 8-19 in New York.

Mrs. Sethna, who was educated in Bombay and London, had a showing of her textiles in Bombay in April. She is currently exhibiting at the Craftsmen Council at Columbia University and at another gallery in New York City.

Other showings of Mrs. Sethna's textiles will be by invitation at the Philadelphia Museum School of Art, the University of Michigan and the University of Virginia.

THIS IS HER husband's first visit to the United States.

Sethna, who received training in England and Germany in the making of documentaries, has made films for the Indian government, the government of Rajasthan, the U.S. Information Service, Ciba, Ltd., and Burman Shell Oil.

Stage Set For Opening Of Pavilion

On July 23, less than three weeks away, Oakland University, Rochester, will stage the grand opening of its first Meadow Brook Music Festival featuring the full Detroit Symphony Orchestra under Sixten Ehrling's direction.

The event signals the first major step in the creation of a complete performing arts program for Southeastern Michigan.

The Howard C. Baldwin Memorial Pavilion is being rushed to completion for the month-long event.

The \$800,000 structure, nestled in a natural wooded amphitheatre, will seat 2,000 under its 40-foot high roof and accommodate an extra 1,000 on the grass.

EHRLING HAS insisted that the programs be of the highest caliber, fully rehearsed, and utilizing the full orchestra. He plans to arrive July 17 to aid in "tuning" the shcedlass acoustical shell which will house the orchestra.

Season ticket committees offering four concerts at three prices, with choice of Thursday, Friday or Saturday series, have sold more than 5,000 season subscriptions. Thursday series at the top price are sold out, but all other price ranges and evenings are available.

From Europe, Ehrling has reported his programs for the Saturday series, substantially different from the earlier announced Thursday-Friday programs.

Photography Magazine Accents Area Lensman

Executive portraits by James R. Israel, 2605 Ayreshire Drive, Bloomfield Hills, are highlighted in the June issue of "The Professional Photographer" magazine.

Israel is the official portrait photographer for General Motors Photographic.

"The Professional Photographer" is the official journal of the Professional Photographers of America, Inc.

The article on Israel is illustrated with a selection of portraits of key company executives. Included in the selection are photographs of Semon Knudsen, vice president, GM Corp., Chevrolet Motor Div.; William L. Mitchell, vice president, GM Corp., in charge of styling staff; and Clark W. Pearson, finance manager, Chevrolet Motor Division.

ISRAEL WAS the first photographer ever hired by a company specifically to take portrait photographs of executives, according to the magazine. He owned and operated his own studio in his home town of Mount Vernon, Ohio, until 1961 when he moved to Detroit and the General Motors Photographic staff.

His subjects are mostly GM executives and their families, but his portrait assignments are varied—portraits for official display, newspapers, magazines, scientific papers, passports, personnel records and other uses.

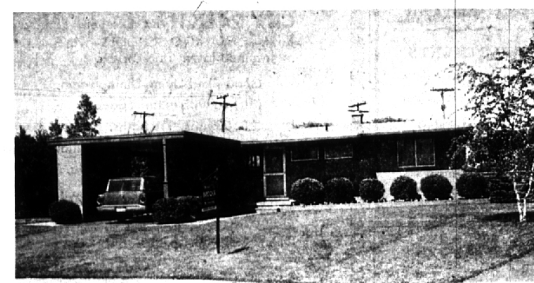

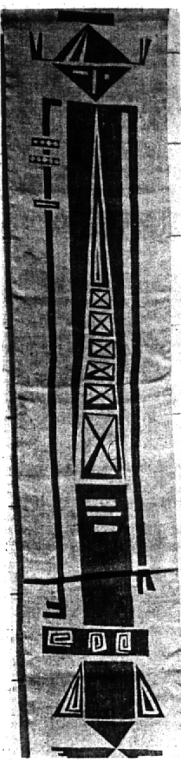

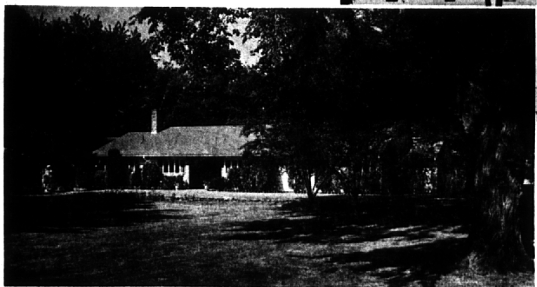
Prize-Winning Table To Compete Again
