County Park Agency Opens New Area at Stony Creek

Stony Creek Metropolitan Park, located near Rochester and Romeo and six miles northeast of Utica, is now open with limited facilities to area residents.

Kenneth L. Hallenbeck, director of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, on behalf of the Board of Commissioners of the five-county agency serving the communities of Oakland, Washtenaw and Wayne.

"Because of the demands of the public for swimming facilities, we're going to open this new park even though food service and picnic areas are not yet completed," said Hallenbeck.

The temporary entrance to the park is at the junction of Mt. Vernon and Snell Roads, just south of 28 Mile Road, which will permit access from Van Dyke (M-58) Highway about six miles north of Utica. At the present time persons coming through the Rochester area may take Highway 150 north to Snell Road.

NEAR THE entrance site are the Park Office and the recently completed Bayport Beachhouse, with over 800 feet of swimming area at Stony Creek Lake providing 500 acres of man-made wetlands, stretching from 26 Mile Road to 28 Mile Road.

Swimming will be permitted at Bayport Beach only, with lifeguards on duty from 9 a.m. to dusk daily. Dressing rooms and showers are open without charge and 144 coin-operated lockers for clothes checking are available.

Two picnic areas are now in semi-readiness. About 70 picnic tables and stoves are scattered throughout the Oakgrove and Winter Cove picnic areas. The White Pine picnic area will be developed until later this summer.

Limited boat launching will be permitted at the southeast end of Stony Creek Lake, with a maximum of 2 launches simultaneously. Launching permits, good for the entire year, must be secured in advance from the park office or from the attendants on duty at the launching ramps on weekends and holidays. The ramp is open daily 7 a.m. to dusk.

There is a speed limit of 10 miles per hour and no water skiing is permitted on Stony Creek Lake. Boats are not permitted to remain in the park overnight.

ABOUT 10 MILES of scenic inland road circle the 9,500-acre park offering views of wooded areas, hilly terrain, colorful countryside and sparkling waters. Two small man-made bays in Lower Lake on July 4 to qualify for the award.

1963 Deer Season 2nd Best in State

Michigan's 1963 firearm deer season goes into the record books as the second best in the state's history with a kill of 124,000 whitetails.

Topped only by the 1952 harvest of 162,000 deer, last season's take was up nearly 30 per cent over the previous year, according to results of the Conservation Department's annual postcard survey of licensed hunters.

BUCK KILL was the highest since 1951, jumping to 74,710 as a record 502,000 sportsmen took to the state's fields and forests. Last season's antlerless deer take rose to 49,360, an increase of 50 per cent above the year before which placed it second to the 1952 total.

Included in the antlerless figure are 11,000 buck fawns and whitetails with sub-legal spikes.

Statewide, nearly one of every four hunters took home a deer. In the Upper Peninsula, more than 30 per cent of the hunters were successful.

Also scoring in the kill column were 25 per cent of the hunters in the northern Lower Peninsula and 12 per cent in the southern Lower Peninsula.

Compared with the 1962 season, buck kill edged up from 17,800 to 19,700 above the Straits, while climbing from 40,130 to 48,220 in the northern Lower Peninsula. Hunters took 6,790 bucks from the southern Lower Peninsula's fast-growing herd to notch that region's new high in kill for the third straight year.

LAST NOVEMBER'S special seasons in 16 trappable areas produced an antlerless harvest of 12,700 animals in the northern Lower Peninsula.

An estimated 515,560 deer licenses were sold last year, shattering the record of 468,623 set in 1953.
