FOUR HUNDRED eighty Scouts, Explorers and leaders from the Detroit Area Boy Scout Council will occupy 240 of the more than 26,000 tents in the huge "temporary" city being prepared for the jamboree, a city which will have its own hospitals, fire department, police department, telephone exchange, barbershops, water department and "snack" shops for those between-meal "cakes and hot dogs."

Construction workmen and men of the U.S. Army's 8th Engineering Battalion, Fort Belvoir, Va., have built a rifle range with 125 firing positions and several rugged obstacle courses.

Most of the 3,000 tents already up and flapping in the Valley's breezes will house commissary, medical and administrative offices.

About 10 miles of water pipe and seven miles of electrical wiring have been laid. A 20-foot telephone switchboard controlling 420 lines has been installed.

SCOUTS AND Scout leaders from every state and 48 foreign countries will attend the Jamboree. Their daylight hours will be filled with activities such as competing against fellow Scouts in the skills center, showing off their abilities in the pioneering area, meeting boys from other lands, engaging in "swap" sessions and dressing up their camp sites.

At night, they will attend patriotic pageants and other shows in a 60,000-seat open air amphitheatre built in a natural bowl. In front of and flanking a 40 x 50-foot motion picture screen in the amphitheatre are four levels of staging on which pageants based on our American Heritage will be presented.

SCOUT OFFICIALS from the National Council have been at Valley Forge since January attending to the innumerable details of readying the great shrine for what is termed "the largest gathering of youth in the free world."

The twelve Troops from Detroit, each consisting of 40 Scouts and leaders, has already attended a special Pre-Jamboree Encampment at the Council's O.A. Scout Ranch near Metamora, on the week end of June 25.

Here they used the same equipment, such as tents, cooking gear, that will accompany them on the train to the Jamboree.

Scout Officials point out that the terrain at the Scout Ranch merely duplicates the rolling hills and wooded slopes of Valley Forge.

Area Army Reserves On Active Duty

The 300th Military Police Prisoners of War Command, an Army Reserve unit based in Dearborn, is undergoing its annual active duty training at Camp McCoy in Wis.

Part of the training that the command will supervise involves handling of prisoners of war, together with other military police specialties such as guarding vital installations, making raids, traffic control and rear area damage control.

With June's 144 traffic deaths, Michigan ended the first half of the year with road toll of 690 persons killed, 141 or 18 per cent more than 789 in the same period in 1963, according to State Police provisional figures.

The half year count was the second worst for that period in 32 years of record keeping, exceeded only by 944 in the first six months of 1937.

June's deaths were 28, or almost 20 per cent, less than 172 for that month a year ago.

FINAL FIGURES for May showed 149 persons killed and 11,102 injured in 21,119 accidents.

The death total was the same as in May a year ago but there were 1,143, or 11 per cent, more injured and 2,191, or 12 per cent, more accidents.

Complete figures for the first five months included 786 deaths and 51,798 injured in 108,467 accidents, respective increases of 28, 13 and five per cent compared with the same period in 1963.

Estimated travel mileage for the first four months, the latest information available, was 11.7 billion, seven per cent more than in the same period last year, while the death rate of 5.3 per 100 million vehicle miles was up 23 per cent on the same comparative basis.

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
