

Boy Scouts from Paraguay Visit On Way to Jamboree

Three Boy Scouts from Paraguay who have been visiting in Birmingham for the past two weeks left yesterday with their Boy Scout hosts for the Sixth National Scout Jamboree at Valley Forge, Pa.

The Paraguayan, part of a group of nine boys, will represent their country at the jamboree which is held every four years. Scouts from 80 countries are participating, as well as 50,000 American scouts and leaders from every state in the union.

The boys from Paraguay arrived by way of Chile, Panama and Miami at Camp Agawan, the Scout camp in Lake Orion on July 2 from Macomb and Oakland counties.

ORDINANCE NO. 101

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE VACATION, REMOVAL, REPAIR OR RECONSTRUCTION OF ANY BUILDING OR STRUCTURE WHICH IS OR BECOMES DANGEROUS TO THE PUBLIC SAFETY OR THE GENERAL WELFARE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BLOOMFIELD, IN WHICH MIGHT TEND TO CONSTITUTE A PUBLIC NUISANCE.

Section 1.01. Dangerous buildings defined. All buildings or structures which have any or all of the following defects shall be deemed "dangerous buildings": (a) Those whose interior walls or other vertical structural members lean or buckle to such an extent that a plumb line passing through the center of gravity falls outside of the middle third of the base.

(b) Those which, exclusive of the foundation, show 2% or more damage or deterioration of the support member or members or form of damage or deterioration of the non-supporting members or members of the roof covering.

(c) Those which have been damaged by fire, wind or other causes so that they are likely to cause damage or deterioration of the support member or members or form of damage or deterioration of the non-supporting members or members of the roof covering.
