TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, County of Oakland, State of Michigan:  
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that in conformity with the Michigan Election Law, the final date for registration in order to vote in the General Primary Election is Monday, August 3, 1964, at 8:00 p.m.

TO VOTE AT THIS ELECTION, all persons must be registered.

Citizens of the United States, 21 years old, who have resided in the State of Michigan six months and in the City of Birmingham thirty days prior to September 1, 1964, are eligible to register.

TO REGISTER: Call in person at the office of the City Clerk in the Municipal Building on or before 8:00 p.m. Monday, August 3, 1964.

TO TRANSFER a registration from one address to another WITHIN THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, send a signed request to the office of the City Clerk stating present address, former address, and date of moving to present address. Such transfer may be made any time up to and including Monday, August 3, 1964, at 8:00 p.m.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that in addition to regular office hours, Monday through Friday of each week, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., the office of the City Clerk will be open for the purpose of receiving registrations during the following hours:

Monday August 3, 1964 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

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### VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS

ORDINANCE NO. 77

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 31,  
KNOWN AS THE WATER ORDINANCE.

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. That Ordinance No. 31 be and the same hereby is amended by the addition of the new sub-section to be known as Section 8.13 reading as follows:

Section 8.13. Each premises served by the 8 inch water main on Pierce Street from Thirteen Mile Road to the northeast corner of Amherst and Pierce Street and the 6 inch water main on Sheridan from Thirteen Mile Road to the northwest corner of Amherst Street shall pay a debt service charge in the amount of \$38.18, payable without interest on or before October 1, 1964; all such premises not paying said debt service charge by October 1, 1964 shall pay said debt service charge, in 8 installments quarterly thereafter, the first said installment being due and payable with interest on the unpaid balance at 6% per annum, on the next water bill for each said premises and continuing quarterly thereafter until paid in full.

Section 2.01. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and shall become effective immediately upon publication.

Made and passed by the Village Council of the Village of Beverly Hills, this 6th day of July, A. D. 1964.

### WMGA Tournament Enters Final Stages

Patti Shook, a 21-year-old Valparaiso, Ind., coed from Saginaw, paced a field of 133 top-notch Michigan women golfers in Monday's qualifying round for the Women's Michigan Golf Association championship.

Miss Shook fired a one-over-par 38-40—78 over the 6,128-yard Tam O'Shanter course in Orchard Lake. The field was trimmed to 112 for the opening round of match play Tuesday with the final round slated for tomorrow.

Last year's runner-up, Miss Shook was the early favorite to win this year with defending champ Sally Werner unable to defend her crown.

THE 78 scored by Patti Monday equaled the course record established by Mrs. John Hume of Red Run in 1952.

The Tam O'Shanter course has

10 out-of-bounds holes, five water hazards and fast greens to menace the golfers in the final two rounds today and tomorrow.

The tournament will conclude Friday with championship finals of 36 holes. The low 32 scorers from Monday have been placed in the championship flight, while 80 other low scorers are divided into five additional flights.

Mrs. Samuel Gawne of Bloomfield Hills led local golfers in Monday's qualifying with an 80, two strokes behind Miss Shook.

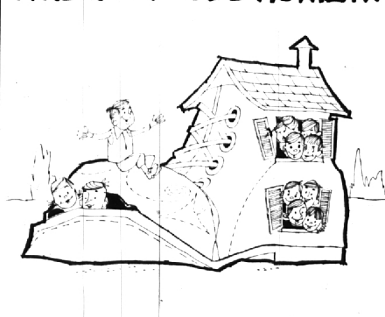
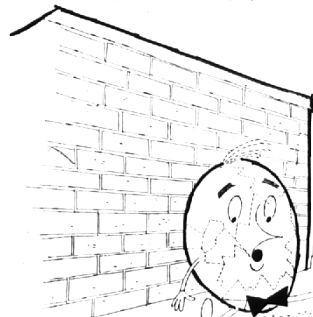

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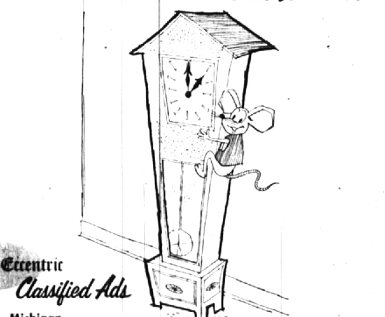
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
