

Striking Unions Predict "Long One"—13 Weeks

Hills School Board Accepts Stock Gift

Federal and state legislators in the Detroit newspaper strike admitted Wednesday that "only under the most unusual circumstances" would they admit to bringing the two striking mechanical unions and the managements of the Detroit News and the Detroit Free Press together again this week.

THE 10-DAY-old strike has resulted in the layoff of over 400 members of the Detroit Newspaper Guild at the two papers and all members of the other mechanical unions among their counter demands was for time-and-a-half for normal shifts at the Free Press on Saturdays.

This is the third major newspaper strike to hit Detroit in the last 10 years. The last one in 1962 lasted six weeks. The longest one in 1955, ran two months.

A spokesman for the striking unions predicted last week that the current action would go "for 13 weeks".

JP in Race For Re-election In S'field Twp.

Orland H. Ellis has filed petitions for re-election to the office of justice of the peace of Southfield Township.

Judge Ellis has been Justice of the Peace of Southfield Township since 1958, when he was appointed by the Township Board to fill the vacancy created by incorporation of the City of Southfield.

ELLIS GRADUATED from Detroit College of Law in 1936 and has been in the active private practice of law since that time, with the exception of four years in military service. The Presidential Unit Citation and the Purple Heart for service at Okinawa were awarded him.

Although Judge Ellis' term does not expire until 1965, he is required to run in the fall elections due to the elimination of the spring ballot under the new Michigan Constitution. Justices of Peace continue to serve at the local judicial branch of the government until the Michigan Legislature creates a substitute system of courts.

"It is important," said Judge Ellis, "to establish a competent, qualified system of justice at the earliest possible moment. The only experience most people have with the law is in Justice Court."

"Upgrading the courts is a duty of the Legislature, which they should act upon at once. The obsolete fee system continues until the legislature acts."

DENNIS AND TIM alternated in giving mouth-to-mouth respiration while the other boys called Beverly Hills police.

Officers Peter Lutz and Jerry Burden responded to the call and when they arrived Karl appeared to be revived.

They rushed him to William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak where the youngster was treated and released.

Mrs. Robert Keydel, who was visiting a next door neighbor when the near-tragedy occurred, said the family has a strict rule that no children are to be in the pool without adult supervision.

She was quick to praise the actions of Tim and Dennis.

"THEY WERE JUST marvelous. I could never say enough about Boy Scouts. Sometimes we forget how wonderful kids really are."

Possibly one of the proudest persons is Frank Miller, 3627 Middlebury Lane, Bloomfield Township, leader of St. Regis Parish Troop 1066, of which Tim and Dennis are members.

"You have no idea how good I felt," said Miller. "Sometimes I wonder if I'm getting through to these kids and then something like this happens."

MILLER SAID the Scouts had recently undergone an extensive training session on life-saving and water safety.

"Tim and Dennis learned their lessons very well. In this case, a matter of seconds meant life or death."

Miller's telephone has been ringing constantly since the mishap, but he doesn't mind at all.

"Many have called to talk about it," he added. "They are overwhelmed that the kids had such presence of mind to act so quickly."
