

Tractor Mishap Takes Life of Township Man

A 26-year-old Bloomfield Township man was killed instantly early Saturday morning when a car struck the rear of a tractor on which he and a friend were riding near Toledo.

James R. Moore, 7316 Glengrove, Birmingham Farms, and James B. DeVilbiss, 24, son of Howard DeVilbiss, a prominent Detroit manufacturer, were both dead at the scene.

According to Sylvania Township (O.) police, Moors and DeVilbiss were riding down a paved road at 3:14 a.m. Saturday on a small utility tractor when a car, driven by a Toledo resident, rounded a curve and struck the tractor.

IT WAS STILL dark and there were no lights on the tractor, police said.

The accident happened about one-half mile from DeVilbiss' father's home near Sylvania.

Moore, married, and the father of one child, was a sales representative for Federal-Mogul-Bower Bearings, Inc. He graduated from the University of Colorado in 1952 and moved to the Birmingham area in April.

He is survived by his wife, Barbara Ann; a son, Gregory, 3; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Neil Moore of Toledo; a brother, Charles of Bloomfield Hills; and sister, Mrs. Harriet Manning of Colorado.

Funeral services were held Monday in Toledo.

Hearing Examiner Jobs Open in U.S.

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has announced that during the month of August, it is again receiving applications for hearing examiner positions in various federal agencies in Washington, D.C. and throughout the U.S. The salaries for these positions range from \$13,615 to \$16,000.

Hearing examiners preside over formal hearings required by law in connection with the work of various federal regulatory agencies and recommend decisions or make initial decisions based on the evidence presented.

ALL APPLICANTS must be licensed attorneys and must have had seven years of experience consisting of responsible participation in the preparation, presentation or hearing of formal cases in courts or governmental regulatory bodies. Two years of the experience must have been in the field of administrative law.

Announcements and application forms may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country or from the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C. 20415. Applications must be filed with the commission's Washington office and must be received or postmarked not later than Aug. 31, 1964.

State Candidates File for Primary

Election officials all over the state were swamped by nominating petitions and \$100 bills brought upon them a week ago Tuesday at the filing deadline.

Experts believe it is the largest number of persons ever to file for political office in the state's history.
