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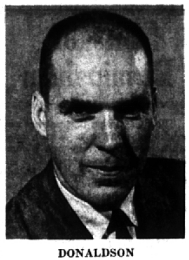

**Tax Expert
Eyes Senate
Seat in 16th**

A 35-year-old specialist in the field of taxation—described by former President Eisenhower as a man of "vision and imagination"—announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for the Michigan Senate in the 16th District.

Bruce Donaldson, a member of the Oakland County Republican Party's education committee, said he would seek the nomination in the Sept. primary because of the existing need in Lansing for a "competent, responsible and representative governmental body."

"Unless this is accomplished," he said, "the federal government will increasingly perform those functions which are traditionally the states' with the result that the balance within our system at each level of government—national, state and local—will be destroyed and undue concentration of power at the national level will inevitably result."

MICHIGAN'S 16TH SENATORIAL District is composed of the cities of Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Clawson, Royal Oak, Troy, and the townships of Avon, Bloomfield, Pontiac and Southfield.

Donaldson, a partner in the law firm of Raymond, Chiro, Fletcher & Donaldson, is a life-long resident of Michigan. Born in Detroit, he has been a resident of Oakland County since 1957. He resides at 16025 Amberst, Birmingham.

Donaldson, a former attorney for the Internal Revenue Service and a national known tax writer in the field of taxation, obtained his law degree at the University of Detroit in 1952; his Master's degree in law, specializing in taxation, at New York University's Graduate School of Law in 1953; and will receive a Master's degree in finance from Wayne State University's Graduate School of Business in 1964.

HE HOLDS membership in several legal associations: the American Bar, the Michigan Bar, the National Bar Association, of which he is secretary; and the American Judicature Society.

Two years ago Donaldson presented to the Republican National Committee a proposal designed to enhance the image of the Republican Party.

Although not adopted, the idea so impressed former President Eisenhower that he personally expressed his appreciation in a letter to Donaldson. "For all that you did, you have my deep appreciation . . . it is highly encouraging to me to find young men of your vision and imagination . . ."

R. P. Varani has filed as a Republican candidate for state senator from the 15th District.

P-1 2-42 Bod Water Plentiful daylight hours and more stay-at-home vacations. He said that sprinkling is a big factor in water usage, as the lots in the township are much larger than the average.

"LAST YEAR, under our well system, we did not have any problems because of our two million gallon capacity."

Hellers also felt that the added Michigan supply with water.

"Home sales have doubled since April when we switched to using Detroit water."

"We can handle as much water as needed. It's just a matter of getting it through the pipes," said Hellers.

COST OF the water in the township is 30 cents per 100 gallons; in Birmingham, because the system has been installed since 1936, it's 25 cents.

Also assuring residents that there's no danger of a water shortage is Donald C. Egbert, engineering manager of the Southeastern Oakland County Water Authority.

Residential areas served by the authority are Berkeley, Beverly Hills, Birmingham, Bloomfield Township, Clawson, Huntington Woods, Lathrup Village, Pleasant Ridge, Royal Oak, Southfield and Southfield Township.

"We've been pumping 50 million gallons of water every day, and we have 20 to 25 million more gallons stored in the tanks, so I don't see any water restrictions in the foreseeable future," said Egbert.

EGBERT SAID the current per capita average is about 400 gallons of water consumption per day. The normal consumption average per capita is 300 gallons per day for each family.

He considers Lathrup Village and Huntington Woods as the heaviest users of water, which average about 1,200 to 1,500 gallons per day for each family per capita.

Egbert said a record water usage high came in early June with 56 1/2 million gallons; a low came in mid-winter when only 17 million gallons of water was pumped.

**State Police Report
Water Death Toll
Increasing This Year**

Michigan's water death toll has reached 144 in 261 accidents in the first six and a half months this year, increases of 40 and 113 respectively compared with the same period in 1963, according to state police provisional figures.

At least 87 persons have been reported injured. Sixty-four of the water accidents involved property damage only.

Of the 126 drownings on which official reports have been received, 62 were swimmers or waders; 20 were boat passengers; 18 were boat operators; 12 fell from bridges, banks, docks or piers; 9 fell through ice; 2 were skin or scuba divers; 2 attempted to rescue others and 1 fell into a caisson.

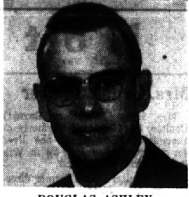
