Wise Shoppers Watch the Meats

Main dishes for summer eating can be easy on the pocketbook, if you understand and use current food supply information.
 During the next several weeks shoppers will see many features on canned pink salmon. Industry and government are joining efforts to boost Alaska's economic recovery and to move current supplies of canned pink salmon.

PRODUCTION OF fed cattle continues at record levels, and experts predict supplies of beef will continue at high levels throughout the summer. Wise shoppers will watch for frequent specials on cuts their families enjoy. Chuck cuts can be frozen for winter use.

Industry will sponsor Summer Turkey Time to encourage greater use during the summer. Since turkeys come in all sizes, fit the turkey size to the occasion, or cook a large bird for several cool meals of turkey sandwiches, salads or cold plates.

Growers cut back the April chick placement for broilers by two per cent from last year, and May placements were cut even more. Since it takes about nine weeks to develop these chicks to broiler weight, this means the summer supply of broilers is going to be a little smaller than anticipated. If retailers continue present methods of merchandising, shoppers should find some broilers featured each week.

Revitalize Greens

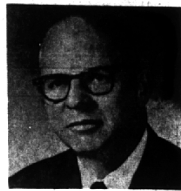

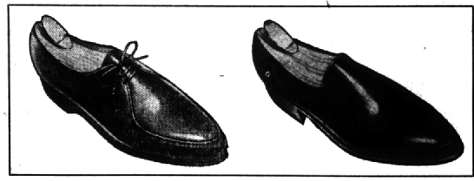
To get a clean cut through a meringue-topped pie, put butter on the knife blade before cutting.
