They received their guests at Kingsley Inn before leaving for Lost Lake Woods Club where they are spending their honeymoon.

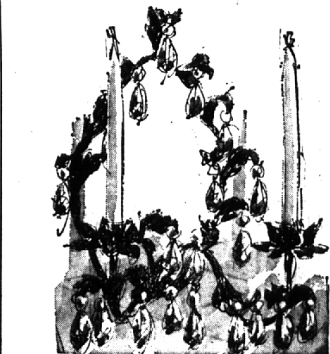
