Colts Qualify For Sectionals

S'field-Lathrup Handed 5-0 Loss

The Birmingham Colt All-Star team blanked Southfield-Lathrup, 5-0, in the District I finals last Thursday to place them in sectional competition at Hamtramck Sunday.

Birmingham swept past three opponents in District competition to become the only undefeated squad in the tournament.

In the Sectional play-offs at Hamtramck, Birmingham will be among teams from Taylor, District II; St. Clair Shores, District III; and Bay County, District IV. All three squads, like Birmingham, were undefeated in district competition.

Taylor will meet St. Clair Shores in the 11:30 a.m. game Sunday, while Birmingham is slated to face Bay County at 2 p.m. The winners of each game will qualify for Regional play, as will the winner of the 5 p.m. game Sunday, pitting the two previous losers. In the event of rain, the games will be played at Hamtramck at the same times Monday.

THE REGIONAL play-offs, including the Ohio champion and the three Michigan representatives, are tentatively scheduled sometime late next week at Hamtramck. The winner will be determined after a two-game knockout tournament.

After defeating Farmington, 3-1, in the opening round of the district play, Birmingham then handed North Farmington a 5-2 setback, putting the teams in the finals.

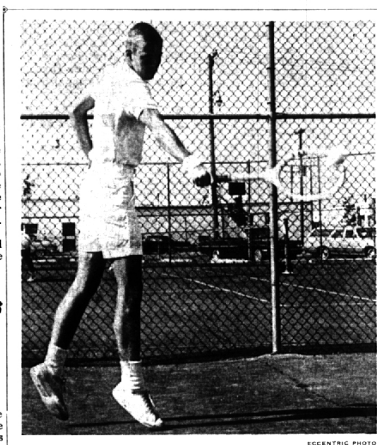
