**TRAFFIC SAFETY:** (with reference to Gov. Romney's special commission.)

"This is a beginning. As your elected representative, I would make a careful study of the committee's recommendations. However, I would carry this further. I would seek the opinions of recognized experts like Harold L. Smith, the originator of the 'Smith System of No Accident Driving.' I would sponsor a bill that would combine and incorporate the recommendations and these opinions."

**DIMINISHING WATER SUPPLY:** "This is a problem that cannot be handled by Michigan alone. It will take the combined efforts of interested citizens in the Great Lakes states and the province of Ontario to arrive at an effective solution."

"I would work for the creation of a commission composed of qualified citizens who can understand the magnitude of the problem and the need for immediate action."

**HALF-WAY HOUSES:** "The problem seems to be how to raise the money . . . without taxing the people. One method would be to earmark part of the fines collected from tickets issued by the law enforcement officers for the purpose of building and maintaining these Half-way houses."

**MENTAL HEALTH:** "As a start I would work for the establishment of out-patient clinics at state hospitals, such as Lapeer and Plymouth, so that a certain amount of preliminary treatment could be given pending admittance on a permanent basis."

# Romney Appoints Man to Board Developing Parks

Kurt R. Heydel, a native-born Detroit and for 20 years a managing partner in a Detroit firm is the newest member of the Board of Commissioners of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority.

The appointment was made recently by Gov. George Romney. As a governor appointee Heydel will serve the unexpired term ending May 2, 1967, and will serve as a representative at large on the seven-member board of commissioners.

He was recently appointed to the Governor's Special Task Force for study and control of all water in Michigan.

THE SEVEN-MEMBER HCMA Board of Commissioners consists of one representative from each of the five counties it serves and two governor appointees including James Clarkson, Drayton Plains for Oakland County.

The Michigan State Legislature passed an Enabling Act in 1959, which created the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority to develop regional parks to serve the people of the Detroit metropolitan area.

Its best-known recreational sites include Kensington Metropolitan Park southeast of Brighton, Metropolitan Beach along Lake St. Clair, Stony Creek Metropolitan Park near Utica, Lower Huron Metropolitan Park near Belleville and Hudson Mills Metropolitan Park northwest of Ann Arbor.

# Twp. Librarian Writes Chapters For City Manual

Bloomfield Township librarian Rose Vainstein is listed as one of the 15 nationwide authors who contributed chapters to Local Public Library Administration, a recently published 375-page manual of the International City Managers' Association.

The book is one of a series of volumes on municipal administration, each a complete and separate training and reference manual dealing with various aspects of municipal government. Previously released volumes in the series include such topics as municipal finance, police and fire administration, recreation, personnel and supervision, and public works.

MISS VAINSTEIN'S contribution, written with John G. Lorenz of the U.S. Office of Education, is titled "Emerging Trends of Library Organization."

It is concerned with the larger unit of library service, the coopera-

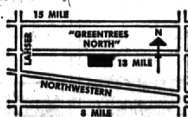
