Guidelines Help Art of Teaching, Say U-M Prof.

What makes one teacher effective, another not? "If there were a formula for classroom discipline that a teacher could rely on, a major source of frustration could be eliminated," says John Cheek, associate professor of education at Flint College of The University of Michigan.

"Unfortunately, no such set of principles exists," says Cheek. "Discipline is not a science. It is the result of human decisions based on individual experiences."

CHEEK OFFERS eight guidelines to aid teachers in setting standards of classroom conduct:

- (1) Nothing does so much to alienate students in good behavior, especially in the higher grades as an atmosphere of work and study in the classroom. Don't be afraid you will lose your popularity by firmness.
- (2) With privileges come responsibilities. Do not abdicate responsibility for making final decisions for your class.
- (3) An authentic, warm and cheerful personality is a prime requisite for a healthy classroom atmosphere. But don't feel you must entertain students.
- (4) Consistency in the teacher's behavior and in the demands made on students is indispensable. If you make a threat, be sure you carry it out.
- (5) AVOID punishing the class for mistakes or misbehavior by an individual.
- (6) Make courses interesting and meaningful. The bored student is a potential behavior problem.
- (7) Behavior must be reinforced positively and negatively by reward and punishment. A student needs to know that consequences follow one's action.
- (8) Be helpful. The student expects assistance and direction in time of need.

Franklin Resident To Lead Romney's County Campaign

Antique Plane, Cars Featured At Barbecue

Members of the Birmingham chapter of the Veteran Motor Car Club will tour to and display their cars at the fifth annual chicken barbecue, Aug. 16, at McKinley Airport in Fraser.

The group and cars have been a feature at all of these annual affairs, which is sponsored by the United Church of Christ of Fraser. Last year they served over 2,000 chicken dinners.

In addition to the old cars there will be a display and demonstrations by the experimental aircraft association. These are home-built airplanes, many of which are of unique design, and with the old cars, have been an annual attraction at the picnic.

AGAIN, A 1928 Ford Tri-motor airplane will be on hand to take passengers aloft, and helicopter riders are also slated.

A feature of barbecue is the chicken, cooked over a hardwood fire, and the sweet corn, which will be picked at sunrise on the day of the affair to assure its freshness.

As the affair is held in a huge, open-air hangar, the barbecue will go on rain or shine. There is parking for 2,000 cars off Hayes Ave., just south of 15 Mile Road.
