

Hills Committee Studies Teacher Salary Scale

Merit pay for teachers in the Bloomfield Hills school system is being considered by the newly formed teacher salary study committee.

Under the chairmanship of school board treasurer Max Miller, the joint committee is composed of board members, teachers, patrons residing within the school district and school administrators.

The committee is presently establishing goals, the basic one of which will be to bring Bloomfield Hills teacher salaries up to the level of other districts in the greater Detroit area.

Proposals made by the teachers earlier this year are being studied.

SUPT. OF Schools Eugene Johnson has presented a salary schedule outline which will be considered further with regard to overall cost at the next committee meeting.

Because the consensus opinion favored a merit-incentive program, Johnson said he would revise the administration plan with such a provision in mind.

Members of the patron group have presented data on salary scales in other school districts and in nonteaching jobs requiring equal college training.

The committee favors a merit provision to provide additional incentive which it feels would be desirable in a system under the new teacher tenure law.

City Manager L. R. Gare said the contract calls for Birmingham to provide routine road repair, maintenance of drainage roadside structures and snow and ice control.

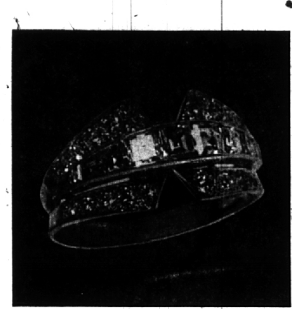
TROY IN RETURN will pay Birmingham \$250 a year for the service.
