Frank D. Webb

Memorial services were held Wednesday in Charlotte for the well known newspaperman and publicist, Frank D. Webb, 67, who died Monday after a heart attack. Webb, a resident of Birmingham and for the past two years editorial consultant for the Village House Publishers, Inc., of Lathrup Village, was at his summer home when stricken. He is survived by his wife, Anna Belle, and a daughter, Janet.

He was born in Ypsilanti and he attended the University of Michigan from where he was graduated. After a brilliant service record in World War I, he joined the staff of the New York Post and then the News. In 1928 he went to the Detroit Free Press where in his six years of employment he served as automotive editor, city editor and won a Pulitzer Prize for single reporting in 1931 and in 1932 as a member of a prize-winning team. Entering the advertising field he worked for Campbell-Ewald and Kuder. He was a member of the Detroit Athletic Club, the recess chair National and Detroit Press Clubs, a former secretary and trustee of William Beaumont Hospital and a lifetime vestryman of St. John's Episcopal Church, Royal Oak. At the time of death he was vice-president and treasurer of Lock Thread Corp., of Detroit whose original product was invented by his late wife.

During his long career with the automotive industries Mr. Evans had been associated with EMP, a chief engineer at Rickenbacker Corp., and more currently a consultant at Kelsey-Hayes. He was a vigorous proponent of four-wheel brakes and a holder of over 100 patents.

He was a member of SAE and the Detroit Engineers and Ordnance Society and a Mason.
