New Monastery Scheduled for Farmington Twp.

The groundbreaking ceremonies for the new Monastery of the blessed Sacrament (Cloistered Dominican Nuns) at 13 Mile Road and Middlebelt will be held Sunday. The ceremonies will begin at 4 p.m. The decision to move from their present location at Oakland Ave. and Boston Blvd. was made several years ago when it was feared that the property would be taken in by the proposed Chrysler Expressway.

A STRICTLY cloistered community, the Dominican Nuns first came to Detroit in 1906, and their present Monastery was erected in 1906. The Nuns lead a life of prayer and penance, seeking God's blessings upon the city and the world. Their chief means of support are the baking of altar breads, the making of vestments and altarpieces and the alms of benefactors. Folk-singing stars will entertain the delegates—the Chad Mitchell Trio on Thursday and Miriam Makeba on Saturday.

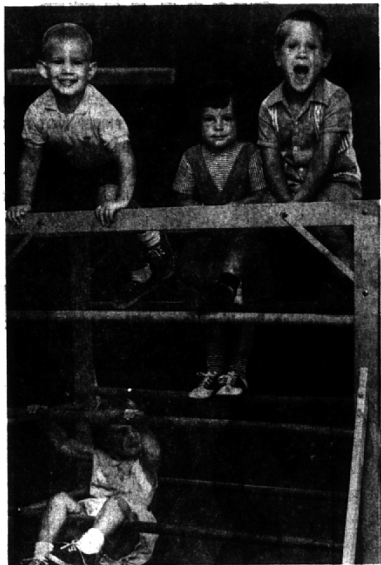
