## U-M Observatory Holds Open House On Peach Mountain

The University of Michigan's Radio Astronomy Observatory on Peach Mountain some 14 miles northeast of Ann Arbor will be open to the public from 2 to 4:30 p.m. on Sunday.

Featuring the 11-story-high "dish" antenna, which U-M astronomers use to measure natural radio waves coming from deep in space, the observatory is located at 10280 N. Territorial Road, west of U.S. 23 north of Ann Arbor. This will be the fourth open house at the site this year. The last will be held on the third Sunday in September.

## Plant Researcher Named Director

An internationally known plant researcher has been named director of the new multimillion-dollar Michigan State University-Atomic Energy Commission Plant Research Laboratory.

He is Dr. Anton Lang, now director of the Eschbarth Plant Research Laboratory and professor of biology at the California Institute of Technology. His appointment as director of the MSU-AEC facility and as professor of botany and plant pathology is effective Jan. 1, 1965.

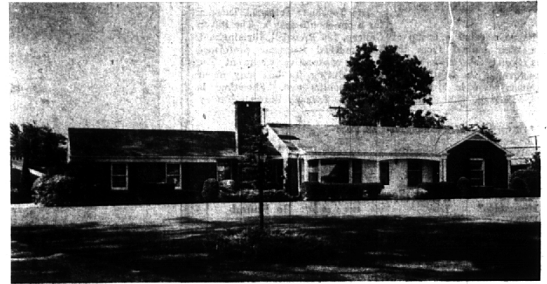
The laboratory, now in the planning stage, will be fully operating in 1967. It will house large-scale basic research on plants and ways in which they are affected by radiation.
