An entry fee of \$1 will be levied and final deadline for registration is next Thursday. Five cards are needed to establish handicaps.

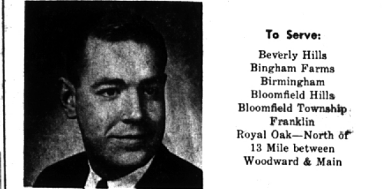

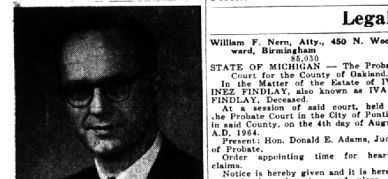
Tennis Tourney Held At Beverly Hills AC
