**Endorsements Given to Senate Hopeful**

BIRMINGHAM — Richard Van Dusen, former legal advisor to Gov. George Romney in Lansing, this week endorsed the candidacy of Bruce Donaldson for nomination as state senator for the 16th senatorial district.

"I endorse Bruce Donaldson," said Van Dusen, "as best qualified by education and experience to make a constructive contribution to the continuing effectiveness of the Romney administration."

Adding their names to the endorsement of the 25-year-old candidate, who is a specialist in the field of taxation, were Henry Hogan, Jr., state representative, and Henry L. Woodland, Oakland County Constitutional Convention delegate.

The 16th district is composed of the cities of Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Clawson, Royal Oak, Bloomfield, Pontiac and Southfield, Troy and the townships of Avon, Donaldson, 16026 Amberst, Birmingham, is a member of the Oakland County Republican Education Committee; holds master's degrees in taxation and finance; and is a partner in the Detroit law firm of Raymond, Chirco, Fletcher & Donaldson.

He is married and has three children.

**Attorney To Run for Court Post**

Gordon S. Smith, Pontiac attorney for 13 years, is a candidate for judge of Circuit Court in Oakland County.

In declaring his bid for the Circuit Court post, Smith, 37, emphasized his legal experience. "Knowledge of the law and of human relationships comes only from constant contact with people in the courts," Smith said.

SMITH IS a graduate of the Detroit College of Law and a member of the Oakland County Bar Association and the Michigan State Bar. He served for several years on the budget committee of the United Foundation.

As a supporter in the formation of Oakland County Senior Citizens and Retirees groups, Smith has maintained an interest in legal and pension problems affecting older age groups. Smith is also allied with homeowner and neighborhood groups in civic and legal aspects of the rapidly expanding out-county area.

"The importance of the Circuit Court has increased immeasurably in recent years," said Smith. "The intensity of emotion generated by social and economic issues of one day have thrust new problems into the courtroom and the people now look to the courts for ever more leadership. What formerly were legislative matters are now resolved by the courts," explained Smith.

"Heated social issues are now pending by court verdict, and even pending legislation awaits court rulings, as in the reapportionment case."

**THE NEED** for younger jurists was characterized by Smith as "immediate and urgent."

Today's heavy litigation demands quick, accurate analysis and decision. The courts must cut through the swath of red tape to arrive at basic truths in relatively short order. This means long hours, intense arduous work, youthful energy and recuperative powers."

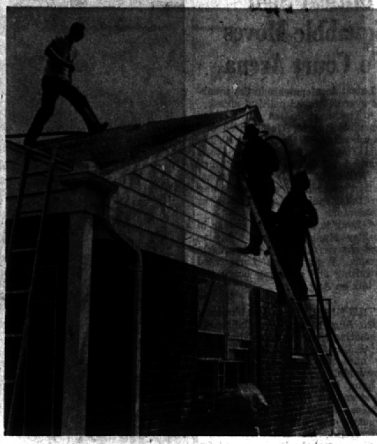

Howard A. Stites, 41, of 1360 Stanley, Pontiac, a Democrat and former county drain inspector and currently a builder.

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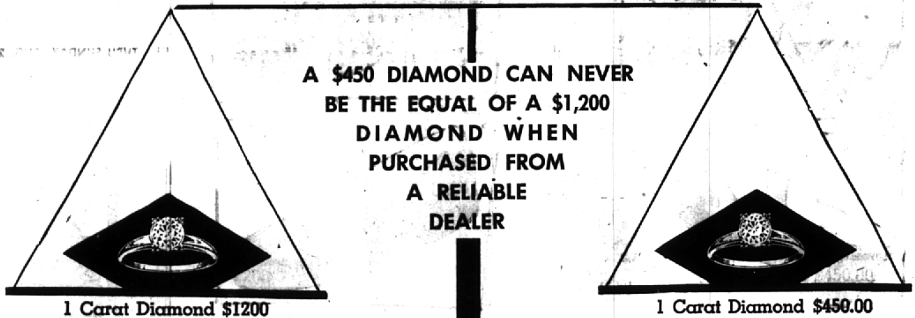
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
