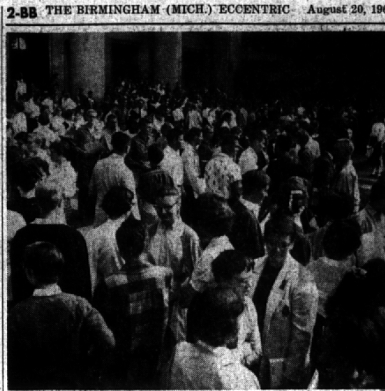

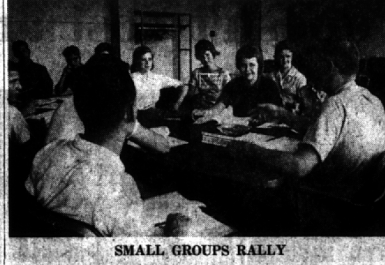

U-M Orientation
Anyone who has ever attended a large university should enjoy a twinge of nostalgia at seeing these pictures from Ann Arbor.
Full orientation at the University of Michigan — a program that's in progress all summer long — starts Aug. 27 through Sept. 29. It's geared to ALL new students, not just freshmen, helping them become acquainted with the campus, its facilities, student life and all that is expected of them at the University.
Following a large mass meeting, students are broken down into small workable groups under an orientation leader (usually an undergraduate student), after which they're ready to face the registration at Waterman Gym.
A special program is planned for the parents who accompany new students to campus, this program held at the Michigan Union.
The expected enrollment for the main campus in Ann Arbor this fall is 28,500. The number exceeds 30,000 if the Dearborn and Flint campuses and various extension centers are considered.
During the course of orientation, women live in Allen-Rumsey House and the men live in Wexley House of West Quadrangle. It is suggested students bring the following items:
Towel, wash cloth and soap, raincoat, comfortable walking shoes and a ball-point pen.

Hills City, Country School Educates 'Gifted Child'
The City and Country School of Bloomfield Hills is located in Bloomfield Hills on the east side of Woodward, a half mile north of Long Lake Road.
There are 12 acres of grounds with a skating rink and a swimming pool, two athletic fields and three playgrounds for the younger children.
The main building houses offices, the nursery school, kindergarten and two first grades. The rooms for art, music, drama, library and dining hall are also located in the main building. Grades two through eight are in the new building.
Each classroom is hexagonal and has a small workroom attached for independent work. The large science laboratory, a biology room and science storage room are also in the new building. The science rooms are equipped with the most modern laboratory facilities.
In 1959 this school was reorganized as a non-profit school enrolling only gifted children from kindergarten on. It is educational, intellectual and non-demonstrative. Based on the philosophy of the school has three distinct purposes: To teach and stimulate the child with instructors supporting each child's native abilities in order to help him develop and use his potential to the fullest.
To develop his personality in such a manner that he will use his knowledge and abilities in a constructive way to help society and to make available to the public, other schools and teachers any new methods and ideas evolved at the school.
The school defines a gifted child as one who has an IQ of 120 or above or superior abilities in the areas of music, art, dance or dramatics. In the latter case, the IQ should be at least 115.
SOMETIMES when a child scores less than 130, it is possible for the examiner to tell from the test that the child's maximum capacity has not been indicated. Such children are sometimes accepted conditionally, subject to retesting after careful consideration of all factors involved.
All children who have been newly enrolled in the grade school since fall 1959 have been accepted on the basis of eligibility by IQ tests, in addition to the usual personal interview and checking of past records.
There are two nursery school groups, one junior kindergarten group and two kindergarten groups. There are three teachers with each group.
Departmentalization has been introduced from the fifth grade through eighth grade. This means that each subject is taught by a specialist. However, the classes are all under the guidance of a home-room teacher.
AVERAGE SIZE of classes is 20. There is no acceleration unless three factors in combination (social, emotional and physical growth) indicate placement one year ahead of chronological age group.
At all times the school works very closely with the parents. Once a year a report is prepared concerning the progress of each student. Academic, social and emotional progress is discussed and conferences are scheduled with parents for this same purpose.
The school operates buses covering a large part of the metropolitan Detroit area, Wayne and Oakland counties.

State Police To Auction Unclaimed Goods
A children's swing and slide set, sewing machine, lawn mower, television sets and radios and a five-by-six-foot picture window are among about 1,500 items to be offered at the tenth annual public auction to be held by the State Police beginning at 9 a.m. today at department headquarters on So. Harrison Road, East Lansing.
Other articles include boys' and girls' bicycles, refrigerator, canvas tent, tools, cameras, rings, watches, clothing, hand saws, lawn equipment, and car parts and accessories, tires and almost anything else a person might be interested in.
THE AUCTION is authorized by law to dispose of stolen, confiscated and recovered articles whose owners could not be identified, equipment lost or abandoned at state parks, and the personal effects of persons who died in state institutions without leaving heirs.
Proceeds from the sale are turned over to the state treasury after deduction of advertising and auctioneer expenses. The sale last year netted the state \$1,937.
Auctioneer will be Glenn Casey of Williamston.
