## IN OAKLAND COUNTY

### S'field, Bloomfield Twp. Spark Building Boom

New housing permit activity for 1964 is likely to set a high not seen since 1956 if the present pace of residential authorizations continues for the remainder of the year, according to the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission.

Southfield, with 826 permits, and Bloomfield Township, with 409, ranked first and third in Oakland County during the first half of 1964.

The planning commission, in its semi-annual report on the issuance of residential building permits in the four-county region of Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Washtenaw, reported that nearly 4,500 more units were permitted during the first six months of 1964 than for the comparable period of 1963.

Permits for single-family units also showed a substantial increase, gaining some 1,500 units.

Major factors contributing to the 1964 increase are the general economic well-being of the state during another good auto year and the mild winter which permitted earlier groundbreaking for new homes and apartments during a normally slow period.

OTHER AREA communities and their total permits were Royal Oak, which ranked second in Oakland County with 662; Beverly Hills, 219; West Bloomfield Township, 209; Troy, 102; Franklin Village, 19; and Lathrup Village, 14.

Oakland County led in single-family permits during the first six months of 1964 with 3,290 and ranked second to Wayne in multiple-family permits with 1,320.

NEARLY 15,000 units were permitted during the first half of this year as compared to 10,960 in 1963, a gain of 41 per cent.

Of the total units, multiples accounted for 5,244, more than doubling last year's output of 2,478. Unlike the prior two years, 1964 per-
