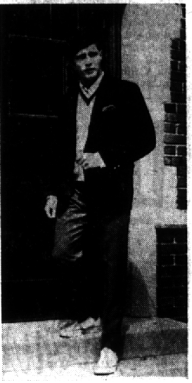
Western Greats
