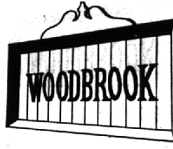

Garden's Beauty Spots Show Interest in Japanese Touch

When you take advantage of the privilege of visiting gardens, you can readily tell when the owner is a horticulturist because the property is a series of beauty spots with surprises in plant selection.

Mrs. John C. Sterritt, 105 Harlan Drive, Bloomfield Hills, is a devotee to her garden. She has an appreciation of the Japanese touch which is shown in the placement of steppingstones, large rocks, and the incorporation of all sites of stones.

You couldn't help but fall in love with her large, covered garden patio. It has a light colored plastic covering with purple wisteria growing on the inside of the roofing and at this date is enjoying the second flowering, with its gobs of large, drooping flowers (like grapes). Mrs. Sterritt reports that the vine flowered the first year it was planted. (Remember, no fertilizer.)

Mr. Sterritt enjoys the barbecue and has herbs growing alongside the grill adjacent to the patio. He has only to lean over and pluck the right herb for his cooking masterpiece.

MRS. STERRITT went to the hilly yard and secured this of various heights which she has filled with soil and used for the planting of sundry herbs to keep those spreading racials under control.

It happened to notice that false evergreen was growing as a ground cover under one of her trees, and extending out from the pattern of false evergreen growth was a free-form covering of white chips with a rock or some detail, again giving the Japanese touch.

At the south side of their home, it is next to their neighbor's garage and service area, they had planted a line of grapes about 30 feet long, which was about four and one-half feet high, and five

vines were supported to form a dense barrier.

IN THE FRONT of the house was a planting of pachyandra placed in a geometric design, extending out from the foundation planting.

The choicest plant our hostess possesses is her Red Jade tree, a variety of flowering crab. It has white flowers, with the tree having a weeping profile. The small fruit formed turns a brilliant red you will never forget if you once see a Jade tree. This would be a wonderful selection for an accent near a terrace or as a specimen in front of a white house.

Woods

August the wealth of summer's woods heads over every field and wayside ditch. Some, like the familiar grasses, legumes and roses, supply us with our cereal grains, many of our garden vegetables and most of our fruits. Yet others, like our orchids, are rare and exotic.

After more than a lifetime of summers spent in Michigan's north woods country, the flowering plants of its woods and fields are filled with familiar friends.

Decorative Day meant the first misty white of shadblow, the grey mouse-ear leaves of poplars, the first mosses flowers in the scrub oak and pine on the shores of Higgins Lake, and the misty blue of bird's foot violet across the cut-over fields.

Memorable canoe trips on the Au Sable River hold the memories of such plants as purple-fringed orchis, grass of Parnassus, wild cucumber vine, fringed loosestrife, blue lobelia and cardinal lobelia.

JOURNEYS TO our Western parks broadened our knowledge and deepened our joy in the Green Kingdom.

In the Alpine meadows at Glacier Park, we counted on a single afternoon 50 species of flowering plants, all hastening to set their seed in the brief mountain summer. Only in the Swiss Alps have we seen a comparable flower show.

Above 12,000 feet on Colorado's Mt. Evans, we enjoyed one of the highest flowers in the United States, association approaching that of the tundra of the Arctic.

Now at Wallow Lake our spring ravines are lush with Canada violets and starred with trillium. In

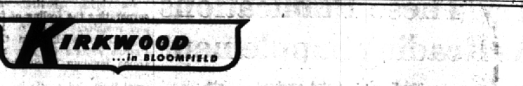

At the end it is the flower standing in the midst of all this green growing which acts as the "index of the species," showing far less variation within each family than does root or stem or branch or leaf.

And so it is that the flower remains essentially an intangible organ ever-tuned to its particular functions of fertilization and to the ripening and dispersal of its seeds.

Nothing short of such perfection of structure and performance could be responsible for that which is nature's chief concern, the propagation and continuance of the species.

THE FLOOR SURFACE of the patio is made up of blocks, brick and even wood, in an interesting motif. Interesting potted plants are placed in clusters in open beds.

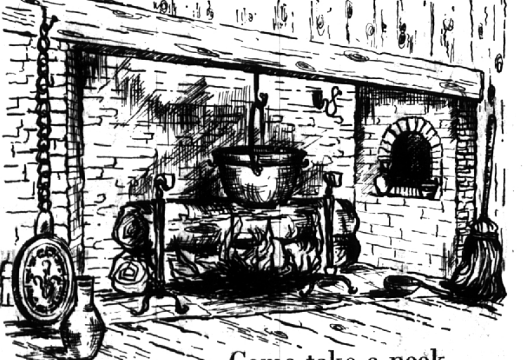
