## Back-to-School Orientation Program Slated by Schools

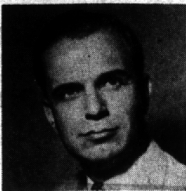
All of the professional staff will attend a two-day orientation program on Tuesday, Sept. 8 and Wednesday, Sept. 9.

Dr. Norton L. Beach, professor of education, Teachers' College, Columbia University will give the major address, "What Must Happen to Education in Western Civilization," at the opening session at Groves High School.

The general session will open with Superintendent Dr. John Blackhall Smith presiding. E. Ross Hanson, president, Board of Education, and Elmer Peterman, president, Birmingham Education Association, will welcome the group. The Superintendent will address the staff; his topic, "Desire Alone is not Enough: There Must Be a Plan."

FOLLOWING THE coffee break, Dr. Beach will give his address. A panel of professional staff members will answer and ask questions of Dr. Beach.

Serving on the panel will be William Corliss, director of Elementary Education, Robert Ford, principal, Derby Junior High, Barbara Marx, Information Services, Mrs. Velma Ruby, teacher, Valley Woods Elementary School, and Charles Buell,

teacher, Seaholm High School.

In the afternoon, elementary teachers, junior high teachers and senior high teachers will each meet in separate sessions.

The elementary staff, which will meet at Seaholm High School, will hear an address "Birmingham Children, Parents, Staff—Present and Future" given by William Corliss.

Grades level discussions on the topic "How Do We Improve Educational Opportunities for Children at Our Grade Level" will be discussed. Principals who will be chairmen for the discussions are as follows: Donald V. Burns, kindergarten; Richard A. Massingill, first grade; Richard Coolman, second grade; Duane Fisher, third grade; Arthur Reller, fourth grade; William Foust, fifth grade, Miss Marjorie Tate, sixth grade.

ROY YANNETTE, Barrum Junior High principal, will preside at the junior high teachers session at Seaholm High School. Dr. James E.

Heald, assistant professor, Educational Administration, University of Michigan, will address the teachers. His topic will be "Targets for Tomorrow." Daniel A. Nesbitt, deputy superintendent in charge of instruction, will conduct a discussion period following Dr. Heald's remarks.

Charles Lundy, principal of Groves High School, will preside during the senior high teachers session.

Dr. Beach will address the group on the topic, "The Revolution of Rising Expectations in Secondary Education."

Superintendent Dr. John Blackhall Smith will conduct the panel discussion following Dr. Beach's remarks. Serving on the panel will be Charles Lundy, Groves principal; Ross A. Wagner, Seaholm principal; Mrs. Katherine Blunt and George Miller, Seaholm teachers; Kenneth Cook and Mrs. Naomi Mandelbaum, Groves teachers.

ELEMENTARY AND secondary teachers will report to their buildings on Wednesday to prepare for receiving students on opening day. Special Service personnel will meet with Dr. George Hallock, new director of Pupil Services, and Bernard Maslanik, coordinator of Special Services. Mrs. Louise Couture, coordinator, Foreign Language Program, will meet with the foreign language teachers.

Mrs. Naomi Erdmann will meet with the remedial reading staff. Art, music, and physical education teachers will meet with their respective coordinators in the morning.

### Candidates Asked To Eliminate Signs On State Highways

The Michigan State Highway Department has asked candidates of both political parties to refrain from posting their advertising signs in the right-of-way of state highways.

Chief Maintenance Engineer H. J. Rathfoot, in letters to Republican State Chairman Arthur G. Elliott, Jr. and Democratic State Chairman Zolton Ferency, said state law prohibits the placing of political advertising within the highway rights of way.

"It has long been the practice of the Michigan State Highway Department to cause immediate removal of political signs which start to appear within a few months of the general election," Rathfoot said.

"WE ARE ASKING you to bring this matter to the attention of all candidates within your party and ask their cooperation."
