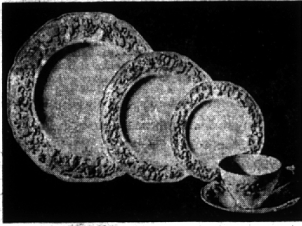

**B'ham Schools Offer New Programs, Courses**

Two new programs and two courses will be offered to Birmingham Public School students this year.

The foreign language program and the remedial reading program will begin in the elementary schools. An advanced physics course and consumer economics have been added at the secondary level.

Each will be taught to all sixth grade students. The audio-lingual approach (listening and speaking) 20 minutes every day will emphasize oral communication. Just as a child begins to learn the English language by listening and speaking, followed by reading and writing, so foreign language experts claim this sequence in language development is the best way to learn a foreign language.

Mrs. Louise Couture, coordinator of foreign language, has developed and written a syllabus for the sixth grade course. Five elementary foreign language teachers have been added to the foreign language staff for the new program.

dent has been designed to prepare students for their role as consumers.

Basic economics as applied to the home will be taught. Areas which will be covered include the following: banking, credit, life, health, property and liability insurance, stocks and bonds, personal and household buying, income tax, social security, budgeting and financial planning, and other legal aspects of homemaking.

The recommendations of the administration and professional staff for the elementary foreign language program and the remedial reading program were supported by the Citizens Elementary Curriculum Study. The additional millage, approved by the voters in June, has made these two programs possible.

**THE REMEDIAL** reading program has been developed to help below-grade-level readers and the child who has not reached his reading potential. Reading specialists will work with small groups of children who have similar reading difficulties.

A specific program for improvement within the child's capacity will be outlined for every child after his reading difficulties have been diagnosed.

The specialist will work with the classroom teacher, the principal, and the coordinator of special services. The program is under the direction of William Corliss, director of elementary education. Parents will be kept informed on their child's progress.

This fall an advanced course in physics will be offered at Seaholm, and in 1965-66 at Groves High School. The Seaholm program has been developed by James Bedor, chairman of the science department.

Since advanced courses in biology and chemistry are presently offered, the new physics course will offer students an opportunity for advanced work in all three areas.
