Lathrup Suggests Joint Library With Beverly Hills

LATHRUP—Councilman Vincent A. Zatlief suggested at Monday's council meeting that Lathrup Village and Beverly Hills "get together" in hopes of jointly forming a library. Zatlief based his suggestion on the Federal Library Act which is making \$25 million available each year for smaller cities to erect their libraries. Beverly Hills used to use Birmingham libraries until high costs forced them to drop it, said Zatlief. "I'm sure that Lathrup and Beverly Hills combined can meet the population requirement." Mayor Richard N. Cogger will appoint a local committee to look into the possibilities of a joint effort.

B'ham to Vote Again on Lot Zoning

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night rescinded action taken July 20 on the zoning of City-owned property on Lakeside in the Quarton Lake Estates. As the July 20 session, the commission defeated a motion to rezone the property from public property to single-family residential. There were four yeas and three nays. The administration had advised the mayor that six affirmative votes were necessary to pass the resolution. This week, the city manager explained that the six-vote requirement was arrived at through erroneous computation and actually did not apply in this instance. So, Monday night the commissioners rescinded their previous action, again in a 4-3 vote, and then adjourned the matter without date pending notification of all parties concerned.

W. B'field Awards School Contracts

The West Bloomfield Township board of Education awarded contracts for the construction of West Bloomfield's first junior high school Friday. A \$689,064 contract went to E. E. Powell General Contracting Co. of Pontiac, lowest of six bidders. The two other major contractors will be the Allen Briggs Co. of Oak Park, awarded a contract for \$72,940 which was the lowest bid of 11 for the mechanical work and the J. P. Miller Electric Co. of Detroit, an \$89,877 contract, the lowest of 10 electric firms to bid.

SCHOOLS SUPT. Dr. Leif A. Hougen said the \$900,281 total is approximately five per cent higher than estimated in March. Construction of the new junior high school unit began this week on the west side of Orchard Lake Road about a mile north of Maple.

Civic Center New Home of S'field Offices

Southfield moved its city offices last week end to the new civic center at 10 1/2 Mile and Evergreen roads. The building is not finished. Saturday morning the shift began. The new offices opened Monday morning for regular business; however, the building is not finished. Work stoppages delayed the scheduled completion date of July 31. All city offices were open Monday except the library. The library will be closed until next Friday, said Glenn Miller, library director. Books will be moved to the new David Stewart Memorial Library in the civic center from the present library at Brooks School.

TELEPHONE NUMBERS will not be changed, city hall and the library remain the same. But municipal court, previously having a separate number, can now be reached at the city hall number. The old number has been dropped. Lawns have been seeded and landscaping will begin soon, officials said. The U-shaped civic center complex is three buildings. The Police and Recreation Department faces north, and the library south. The city offices, housing the police department, municipal court and the city council chambers, are in between in the bottom of the "U" and face west.

Sidewalk Waiver Denied by Lathrup

LATHRUP—City councilmen denied a request by James L. Peterson, 29245 Golden Gate Drive, for a waiver of the sidewalk requirements. Peterson wanted to substitute a circle drive for a straight walk in front of his home. Council members, who had spent 90 minutes Monday night working out new ordinances on sidewalk construction, denied the request on the grounds that Lathrup will require that all homes have regulation sidewalks.

Lathrup Hears Request to Vacate Road

LATHRUP—Council members heard a petition to vacate a flair-out off Meadowood Court south of the Southfield junction at their meeting Monday night. The council referred the petition to the Road and Traffic Safety Committee and the Forestry Advisory Committee for further study, and indicated that a public hearing would also be necessary. Petitioning for the vacation is Robert C. Hauke of Southfield, who is seeking an office structure on the property. The 20 feet that Hauke would gain through vacating would be used as parking space for the proposed building.

HAUKE'S ARGUMENTS included that Southfield could now handle traffic without the flair-out; that the flair-out is overgrown with weeds and is hard to mow; and that the property would be back on the tax rolls if it were used as a parking area. Warning against vacating was City Attorney Everett Hayes. "If we vacate this flair-out, we'll have to vacate all fair-outs," Mayor Richard Cogger said he would like to see this area used as part of Lathrup's tree-planting program, and a parking area would interfere with the project. Coming out in favor of vacation was Mayor Pro Tem Elizabeth Mitchell. "This would supply us with an answer on our parking problem on Southfield and will help us with taxes," she said.

Insurance Firm Tops Sales Goal

Gleaser Life Insurance Society, located in Birmingham, has passed the \$70,000,000 mark of life insurance in force at the end of July, during their 70th year of operation. R. G. Ranford, president, said, "This important milestone in sales and fraternal service in six states is most significant because all of the insurance is on individual lives of members." He also announced that for the first six months of 1964, Gleaser Life considerably increased premium income and insurance in force over the same period in 1963. The Society substantially increased the persistency ratio over the similar six months of last year. Ranford said that at the end of July, Gleaser Life had a net gain of \$2,300,000 of life insurance in force over the end of 1963. The Society achieved the \$20,000,000 mark at the end of 1961, slightly more than two and one-half years ago.

Twp. Gives 'Red Light' to Drag Racers

Bloomfield Township took a swipe at drag racers Monday night. The board amended the traffic ordinance, making it unlawful for a person to operate a motor vehicle upon a highway or street in a speed contest or for the purpose of making a speed record, including that commonly known as a drag race. The amendment implements recently-passed state legislation which makes drag racing a violation until itself.

IN THE PAST, law enforcement officers have been forced to choose between speeding and reckless driving in ticketing persons engaged in speed contests "from a standing start." Another amendment passed by the board prohibits the use of vehicles without two rear stop lights.

Cancer Foundation Chairman Cited For County Service

Mrs. Thomas Houle, 7448 Franklin Court, Franklin, was honored last Thursday by the Michigan Cancer Foundation for six years of service as loan closet chairman of the South Oakland Unit.
