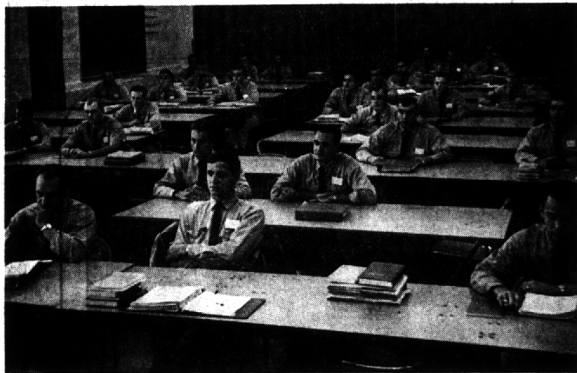

6-Week Course Readys Rookies For New Duties

Becoming a policeman is no longer a simple task of buying a gun, donning a uniform and putting on a badge. Today's law enforcement officer is a highly trained, skilled individual.

Next month four rookie patrolmen, Ronald Sagar, James Kutsko, William Walters and Stephen Fairman, will become members of the Birmingham Police Dept.

Since their employment by the City, the men have been taking a six-week course in police procedures at the Metropolitan Police Academy of Michigan.

THE SCHOOL, located in the Detroit Light Guard Armory, is operated by James and Louis Berg. The Berg brothers are two of Detroit's best known police officials. Louis, 3689 Darcy, Bloomfield Township, was formerly superintendent of Detroit's 5,000-member department and James was his deputy.

The academy's curriculum consists of 240 hours of study dealing primarily with criminal law. Subjects include laws of arrest, search and seizure, firearms training, first aid and Michigan traffic laws.

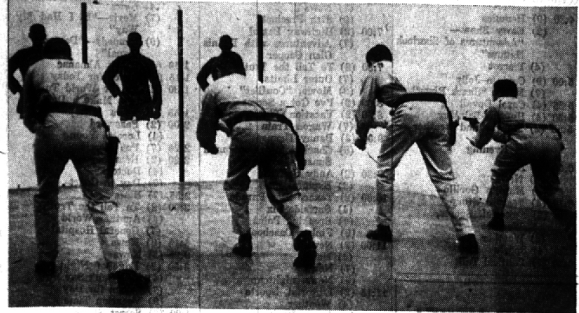
Because there is a wide variance from community to community no attempt is made to cover local ordinances.

All of the school's instructors serve on a voluntary basis. The faculty is made up primarily of chief's of police of the various suburban communities. Birmingham's Ralph W. Moxley is on the board of directors.

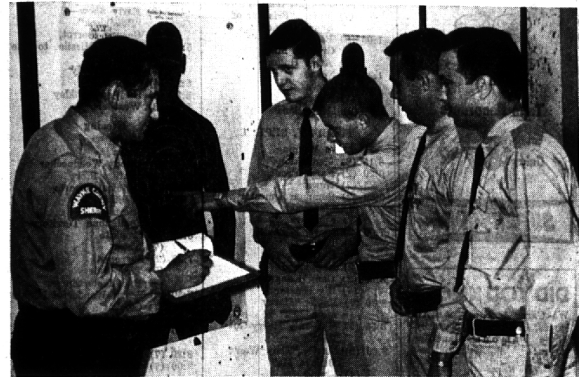
IN ADDITION representatives of the FBI, U.S. Immigration, Secret Service, Michigan State Police, Detroit Police and the Oakland and Wayne county prosecuting attorneys' staffs take part in the program.

The membership of the present class, which will graduate tomorrow night, is made up of 67 men from 23 communities in the metropolitan area.

The Birmingham men will shed their khaki cadet uniforms and switch to the familiar blues and be on duty Monday.

New Sign To be Tested On Highways

The State Highway Department reports that it will test a new "no passing" sign on two long sections of highway.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said the pennant-shaped signs, which are placed on the left side of the road, will be put up along 180 miles of US-12 between Alpena and Charlevoix.

The State Highway Department has been testing the new signs at spot locations throughout the state since 1961.

"WE'VE RECEIVED a number of favorable comments on the pennant-shaped 'no passing' signs and we are continuing the experimental use of this sign in order to obtain additional public exposure," Mackie said.

"Installation of these signs on a continuous route."

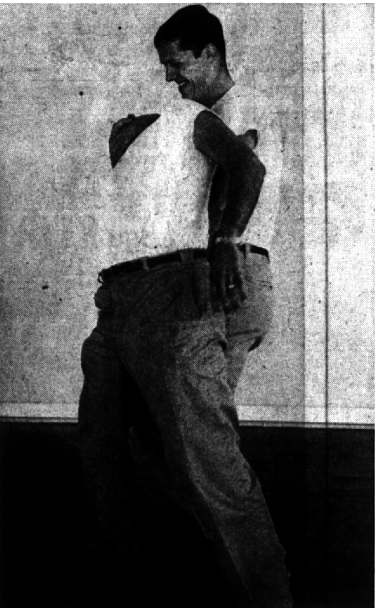
Conventional "no passing" signs are posted on the right side of state highways at the beginning of "no passing" zones. The zones also are marked by a yellow strip of paint that runs the entire length

of the zone along the center of the highway.

MACKIE SAID motorists traveling on US-12 and M-32 will be observed during the study and that some drivers will be asked for their comments on the new signs.

The existing "No Passing" signs on the right side of both highways will remain in place until the study is completed.

The pennant-shaped "No Passing" signs are now being put up along M-32 and will be created soon on the entire length of US-12.

U-M Clinic Studies Birth Defects

University of Michigan physicians are testing an electronic urinary bladder stimulator to aid victims of certain birth defects.

The project is one of many now being conducted at the U-M Birth Defects Clinical Study Center with the aid of a \$56,012 grant from the National Foundation — March of Dimes.

Most of the work at the research center is with youngsters who have birth defects involving the nervous, muscular or skeleton systems.
