Historical Painting Shows Indian Village in Michigan

Indians, who had lived in Michigan before the French explorers and missionaries arrived in the early 1600's, favored small private "residences." The wigwams of the Potawatomi and other Algonquian Indians consisted of dome-shaped frameworks covered with bark and mats made of cattails laced together with fibers.

These facts are reported by Prof. F. Clever Bald in a text accompanying a painting of "Michigan Indians—An Algonquian Village" by artist Robert A. Thom, 6168 W. Surrey, Birmingham.

The painting of Michigan Indians by Thom is one of a series he has been commissioned to do by the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. to advance knowledge of Michigan's past.

DR. BALD, director of the Michigan Historical Collections at the University of Michigan, said the painting portrays a typical Indian village. Michigan Indians lived in wigwams shaped like crude huts. Dr. Bald said hides of animals were too valuable for use as clothing to stretch over poles to make tepees.

Most Michigan Indians belonged to the Algonquian language

group. One exception was an Iroquoian tribe called the Wyandots or Hurons. Although the Hurons spoke an Iroquoian dialect, their customs were generally similar to the Algonquians.

The most striking difference was in their dwellings. Instead of wigwams, they built log houses, sometimes more than 150 feet in length. They set two parallel rows of posts firmly in the ground, about 35 feet apart.

AT A HEIGHT of about 20 feet, the poles were bent inward and fastened together. Top and sides of the "dwellings" were covered with bark, except for a strip in the roof to permit smoke to escape. Inside was a center aisle with compartments on each side for families. Fires in the aisle served for cooking and heating.

Michigan Indians, with a culture as much as 5,000 years behind the most advanced European civilizations wore little clothing. Moccasins decorated with porcupine quills protected their feet.

Some wore ornaments of stone or copper from the nose and ears. One or two feathers held by a band around the forehead provided a traditional touch for the well-dressed Indian.

IN THE winter, the Indians covered themselves with bear grease to keep warm and wore robes of bear or beaver skins. Women sometimes wore only a skirt. In moccasins, they wore weather, they wore long leggings, a skirt and a fur robe. For ornaments they had bracelets and earrings of shell wampum and carnelians.

Thom's painting, an Indian summer scene, shows Indians drying corn, grinding corn in a crude log mortar and preserving pumpkins and squash. A lucky hunter drags a deer into camp.

The Indians used deer as their basic meat staple. Hides served as clothing and deer bones were used into useful items such as hide scrapers, awls, harpoons, fish hooks and needles.

The Indians made birch bark canoes, sealing seams with pine pitch. Birch bark also was used for storage containers and baskets.

INDIANS MADE pottery of good quality and cooked food in pottery vessels. Water was heated by putting hot stones into these pots.

According to Dr. Bald, scientists have pieced together evidence of Indian life in Michigan as long as 8,000 years ago. Studies indicate one of the first tribes lived in the Upper Peninsula and Isle Royale where they used copper to make weapons and ornaments.

Other prehistoric Indians moved into Michigan from the south about 2,000 years ago. They farmed the fertile valleys of the St. Joseph, Kalamazoo and Grand Rivers.

Romneys Open Interlochen Arts Festival

Gov. George Romney (of Bloomfield Hills) extended an official Michigan welcome and his wife Lenore received a citation for her cultural activities Wednesday in one of the high points of the first Interlochen Arts Festival.

The welcome, in the form of a speech by Michigan's chief executive, was for the Philadelphia Orchestra and its conductor, Eugene Ormandy, who presented the first of five Interlochen concerts that night.

The festival's Governor's Day is expected to become a regular feature of the arts event.

The opening concert by the Philadelphia Orchestra is being followed by one each tonight through Sunday.

Wednesday's program also included baritone William Warfield's narration of Aaron Copland's "A Lincoln Portrait," with the orchestra under Ormandy's baton.
