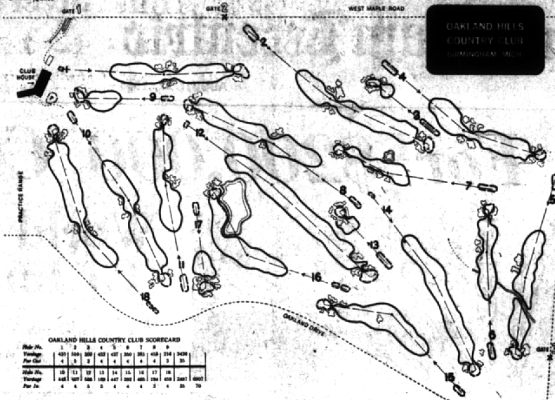

Yawning traps, trick greens dot 6,907-yard, par-70 course.

Hills measured 7,087 from the extreme tee for the 1987 Open. It was the longest course the Open was held on until Congressional's 7,083 yards for the 1964 Open.

The extreme tees weren't used for the 1987 Open when Ralph Guldahl, won with 281. Sam Snead, 262, competing in his first Open had finished minutes earlier with 283 and looked like the winner. But Guldahl charged a 35-foot putt at No. 8 for an eagle, came on for a finishing 69 to win by two strokes. Guldahl's previous rounds were 71-69-72.

WHAT MAKES Oakland Hills so tough? Ask Bobby Jones, who was the defending champion in 1924. On the par-four tenth he had successive scores of 6-6-6-6, seven strokes over par. He lost by three shots to Cyril Walker.

Oakland Hills was just a month short of being in play six years when the 1924 Open was held. Work on the course began in 1917. When Walter Hagen was hired as pro, in 1920, Al Watrous became the club's fourth pro.

Watrous soon was Michigan's most titled golfer with nine Michigan PGA titles, six Michigan Opens, three U.S. Senior PGA's. He was runner-up in the British Open, member of the first two U.S. Ryder Cup teams.

He added the World PGA Senior title in 1957 as he played an important part in developing Oakland Hills as a monument to golf.

Now the first Carling World Golf Championship is going to add another chapter to golf history at Oakland Hills as it brings together 155 of the world's golfers with a record \$200,000 at stake.

The rough was a little easier because of a dry summer and the pros were accustomed to their trapping when 30-year-old Gene Litter won the 1961 Open at Oakland Hills.

Yet he was the only one to break par twice as he has scores of 73-68-72-68 for 281, the same score with which Ralph Guldahl won the 1987 Open at Oakland Hills.

In contrast to only two rounds under par in 1961, there were 18 in 1961. There were five 67's, three 68's and ten 69's. Hogan finished in a three-way tie for 14th at 289.

Cans, Redheads Legal Targets for '64 Season

After four long years, Michigan duck hunters will again be able to legally bag two of the sport's best-tasting fowl—redheads and canvasbacks.

The two species, protected since 1960 when their numbers dropped dangerously low, have increased to a point where the Michigan Conservation Commission has put them back on the ledger, on a limited basis.

State gunners will get a later start, but will enjoy five more days of shooting during the 1964 40-day season, which will run from Oct. 8-Nov. 16.

THE LATER DATE will provide lower peninsula hunters with a better shot at the peak duck migration down the Mississippi Flyway, of which Michigan is a part. Basic daily duck limits will remain at four with eight in possession, the same as in 1963.

However, the daily limit must not include more than two wood ducks, two mallards, and two of either redheads or canvasbacks or one of each. The possession limit will be the same with the exception of allowing four mallards.

The restriction on mallards has been due to the serious drop in their numbers as a result of droughts in the northern nesting grounds.

Wings Schedule Exhibition Games

This fall, for the first time in local hockey history, the Detroit Red Wings will play two pre-season games at Olympia Stadium against National Hockey League teams.

Red Wing manager-coach Sid Abel announced today that the Wings will meet both Toronto and Chicago in September games at Olympia.

The contest between the Wings and the Maple Leafs, last spring's playoff finalists, will be Thursday, Sept. 17. The Wings will then take on the Black Hawks, the team they eliminated in the semi-finals last year, 10 days following the Toronto battle, on Sunday, Sept. 27. Ticket prices for these games will be \$11, \$9 and \$5.

INTEREST in the Detroit-Toronto series has heightened locally because Terry Sawchuk, longtime Red Wing goalie, is now with the Leafs and probably will start against his former team.

Sawchuk was drafted for \$20,000 by Toronto last June.

Abel has tentatively arranged several other pre-season games. "We hope to get in at least two games before the 1964-65 NHL season opens about the middle of October," Abel said.
