Cooking Up a Storm

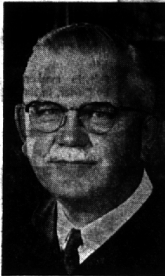

Military Academy Sets Natl. Exams

The 89th annual competition for entrance to the U.S. Coast Guard Academy will commence with the Dec. 5 administration of the College Entrance Examination Board Tests. These examinations will be given in over 2,000 test centers.
Appointments as cadet, United States Coast Guard, are made solely on the basis of competitive examination and prospective adaptability to military life. There are no Congressional appointments or geographical quotas.
An applicant must be a high school senior or graduate, who has reached his 17th but not his 22nd birthday by July 1, 1965. Applicants still in high school must graduate and earn 15 units by June 30, 1965.
The units must include three in English, two in algebra and one in plane geometry. Applicants must be in excellent physical condition, between 64 and 78 inches in height, with proportions weight, and have at least 20/20 vision in each eye, correctable to 20/20.

THE ACADEMY curriculum includes academic subjects and military training. Courses are conducted in the sciences, engineering, the humanities and subjects related to the professional duties of a Coast Guard Officer. Cadets are also schooled in the fundamentals of atomic science through the use of a digital computer and nuclear reactor on the academy grounds.
During their training, cadets are paid \$1,333.80 per year.
Upon completion of the academy education, cadets are commissioned as Ensigns in the Coast Guard and awarded Bachelor of Science degrees.

Extra-curricular activities include a variety of clubs and athletics. Coast Guard teams compete with many colleges in football, basketball, swimming, track, and other major sports under the direction of Commander Otto Graham.

COAST GUARD cadets spend a portion of each summer at sea, training aboard the bark eagle and major cutters. Past training cruises have taken the cadets to such interesting ports of call as Oslo, London, Copenhagen, Lihon and Antwerp.
The Coast Guard is a military service and is one of the five Armed Forces. While history finds the Coast Guard fighting in all of our wars with many recorded deeds of valor, traditionally the service takes its greatest pride in peace-time activities.

AF Sends SOS For Loadmasters

"We need them and we need them badly," declares Colonel Garl F. King, commander of the Air Force Reserve 403d Troop Carrier Wing at Selfridge.
He was speaking of men experienced in airborne cargo work. They are known in the Air Force as loadmasters.
The 403d is authorized forty loadmasters within the Wing. They are an integral part of loading, tie-down and dropping equipment from C-119 aircraft. They are part of the C-119 aircraft.
FORMER SERVICEMEN with loadmaster skills are very scarce, and, Colonel King admits, "It is almost like looking for a needle in a haystack." Qualified ex-servicemen from the Army or Air Force from any location in southeast Michigan will be considered for the unit.
But, the Colonel stressed, "We haven't time to train anyone from prior Army or Air Force experience."
