only one gripe. "I've finished second five times and third twice in the last seven tournaments, and I'm getting darn sick of it," he said.

The final day's attendance brought the four-day total to 40,307, approximately 10,000 short of early predictions. But, a combination of television and weather undoubtedly hurt the gate. Friday's round finished in a downpour, with floodlights and headlights from 12 cars focused on the 18th green.

Nichols picked up some tips from Ben Hogan in practice rounds on how to play at Oakland Hills. It was Bantam Ben who wrote Nichols after Bobby nearly died in a car crash while in high school—a crash that stopped a possible football career.

The Carling World Open was designed to bring in foreign players, but few were around at the end. Besides those that appear on the tour, the highest finish was by British PGA champ Peter Butler who tied for 17th for \$1,616.

George Archer, first-round leader with a course-record 65, dropped out of contention and earned \$995. He also, set a back-nine mark of 31. Nichols fashioned a new front-nine record of 31.

THE TOURNAMENT saw 23 sub-par rounds, but only Nichols and Palmer bested par over 72 holes. Some pros took it hard. Others, like showman "Chi Chi" Rodriguez, took a lighter view, using his pen for a tee during Sunday's final round.

## Everything's Ready For U-D Freshmen

The University of Detroit is all set for the 1964-65 school year. U of D students residing in the residence halls and girls living in off-campus housing are welcomed officially by the dean of men and the dean of women at dinners and teas respectively Sept. 13.

Sept. 14-16 are the days incoming freshmen attend group meetings, welcoming speeches by the president, the dean of men and the deans of their respective colleges.

The individual groups are set up according to the incoming students' planned major. Sophomore, junior and senior students cover a prepared itinerary which explains to new students various university regulations, dress procedures, class procedures, the system of cuts, marking and grading which are standardized throughout the university.

ALSO COVERED in these three days are pep rallies to acquaint the incoming freshmen with the school cheers and songs. Students are instructed as to the requirements of their program, the necessary courses for degree, the retreats required of all Catholic students and the sock hops after most football and basketball games.

Various campus organizations and their functions; sororities, fraternities and honor societies in which freshmen might be interested; and the various service organizations sponsored by the university are explained.

TOURS OF ALL campus buildings and facilities take place during the day, while nights are filled with an open house, wiener roast, Greek nights, mixers and a freshman talent show.

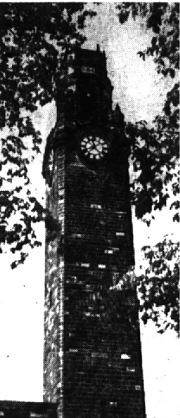
During these three days all campus offices and the deans and assistant deans of each college are available for any questions the incoming freshmen may have.

All registrations for the up-town, McNichols Road campus take place Sept. 17-18. Incoming freshmen register with their groups, aided by their group leaders.

ALL OTHER returning students register by an alphabetical pre-arranged schedule. During this time, the students not registering continue to have group meetings where further discussion of university procedure takes place.

The Freshman Welcome Dance is held Sept. 19 in the U of D Memorial Building. All incoming freshmen are welcome to attend this star get-acquainted dance, at which members of the orientation committee put on skits about university life.

Classes begin Sept. 21. Expected total enrollment for the 1964-65 school year is over 10,000.

### Accounting Machine Purchase Approved

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night authorized the expenditure of \$4,879 for the purchase of a new accounting machine.

Financial Director James H. Purkins, Jr., said the new machine will be used to prepare all accounts payable by checks, post all City accounts as well as prepare monthly budgetary statements.

Purkins said repairs to the city's present accounting machine, a 1952 model, would have amounted to about \$1,700 and there would be no satisfactory guarantee that the machine would be usable for any length of time.

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### Lathrup Soldier Prepares for Korea

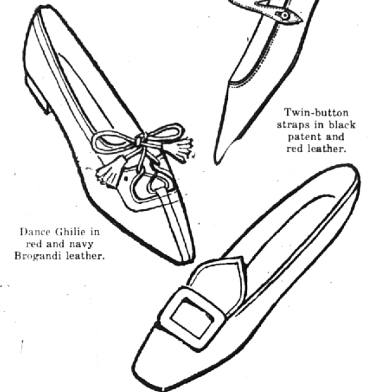
