

City Cuts Trees In Parking Lot

Work was expected to continue today on the removal of six trees from the new parking lot No. 7. Birmingham city commissioners Monday instructed the administration to cut down the trees in the block south of Shain Park.

The remaining 10 trees in the lot will not be cut down until a permanent design of the lot has been determined.

City Manager L. R. Gare told the commission that the last house has been removed and all that stood in the way of the project was the trees.

Because of the lateness of the season, the administration plans to continue to use the lot as a temporary one until "at least next spring," Gare said.

Nearly all of the trees scheduled for removal at this time are Silver Maples which the administration considers undesirable.

A motion by Commissioner David P. Breck to leave all of the trees until the permanent lot is designed was rejected.

Breck said he felt the City might be "sorry" if it was decided at a later date the trees might have been rejected.

Dearborn Man Jailed For Assault, Battery

A 26-year-old Dearborn man has been sentenced to 90 days in Oakland County Jail for assaulting a Bloomfield Township police officer Sunday night.

John J. Collins pleaded guilty Monday morning before Justice Alice Gilbert. His sister Mary Ann, 20, also of Dearborn, and Judith Ann Klacking, 20, of Garden City, were fined \$20 for being drunk and disorderly.

Victim of the attack was Patrolman Fred Harbrueger who was cruising on Timber Ridge in Birmingham Farms subdivision at 11:42 p.m. Sunday when he saw a car with the lights out and a girl sitting on a front lawn nearby.

When Harbrueger stopped to investigate, the girl ran back to the car. The officer said Collins warned him "not to mess with my sister" and then struck him.

VOTERS GAVE Gov. George Romney a commanding margin over his opponent, George Higgins, for the Republican nomination for governor. The final vote was Romney, 4,897; Higgins 385.

William P. Hampton of Birmingham rallied up a 2-1 margin over his nearest opponent in a bid to succeed Rep. Henry M. Hogan, Jr., in the 65th legislative district.

The totals were Hampton, 2,375; William R. Brownfield, 1,031; Stanley M. Brown, 862; and Denton F. Hassell, 745.

Robert J. Huber of Troy, with 2,014 votes, outpolled his nearest contender, J. Bruce Donaldson, 1,706, in the race for state senator in the 16th district.

A total of 5,874 of Bloomfield Township's 15,017 registered voters went to the polls Tuesday.

Parking Lot May Become Parking Lot

A small triangular piece of property at the corner of Worth and Webster that is currently designated a public park may become a parking lot.

The Chamberlain Realty would like to buy the land from the City and build a parking lot.

City Manager L. R. Gare said that although the land is dedicated as a park it has been used as a parking lot for some time.

In a letter to the commission, Calvin Chamberlain said he was in a position to give the City approximately 79 acres of low land along the Rouge River as part payment for the Webster-Worth property.

Gare said the Rouge property would have some value as flood plain land. The City has been trying to acquire as much land in the Rouge Valley as possible for flood control and recreation area.

Traffic Controls Same; Yet Problem Eliminated

Although traffic volumes have increased considerably at the intersection of Brown and Bates, no new traffic controls will be installed at the location.

Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley told commissioners last week he did not believe any changes in regulations were needed at this time.

Several weeks ago the commission asked for a study of the area after residents had complained it was hazardous. The study was to deal particularly with visibility and parking problems.

Moxley said his department found a visibility problem did exist because of a large hedge on the corner.

"This was found to be in violation of the shrubbery ordinance and was reducing visibility for northbound and southbound vehicles," said Moxley.

The hedge had been trimmed and several branches from long hanging trees had been removed and the problem eliminated.

"The parking problem was also studied and it was found that parking had already been removed for approximately 50 feet from the intersection on three of the four corners of Brown and between 20 and 30 feet on Bates," Moxley said.

The only problem he said appeared to be on the northwest corner of the intersection along Brown.

Ornamental Lighting OK'd

Ornamental street lighting will be installed on Chester Street between Maple and Brown.

City commissioners Monday night approved a Detroit Edison request to provide additional lighting on the street.

L. R. Gare, city manager, said the light company felt the existing lighting on Chester did not meet the standards for illuminating a major street.

Gare said the exact locations of the new lights will not be determined until the City is certain of the final pavement width for Chester.

He said there would be no cost to the City for the installation of the additional lights but the rate would be adjusted to cover the change.




