that the party hierarchy has already put aside its differences over the credentials issue at the convention. According to some delegates, differences like these don't get settled that easily.

Democrats will convene in Lansing Sept. 18 to select their candidates for lieutenant governor and other state offices in the Nov. 3 election. It is at this convention that many delegates expect more fireworks to erupt.

One delegate, who asked that his name not be mentioned, suggested that the credentials issue

may only be a surface indication of a deeper conflict.

Another delegate mentioned, "It might be put aside for the campaign but you'll probably hear of it again."

IN AN interesting sidelight, former Gov. John Swainson, the national committeeman, and State Chairman Ferency, who customarily have had strong support from the United Auto Workers Union as well as other labor unions, were on the opposite side in the credentials dispute.

Swainson and Ferency, along with delegate Andrew West, were the only members of the 12-member steering committee of the state delegation to oppose the compromise.

The three demanded that Mich-

igan continue pressing for a minority report which would have led to a floor fight over the seating of the predominantly Negro Mississippi Freedom Democrats.

THE ACTUAL compromise, which was a successful White House effort to stop a floor fight, was seen by some as having political significance to the Swainson-Ferency position.

Michigan AFL-CIO President August Scholle, who had led arguments for adoption of the compromise on Mississippi, said he could not explain Swainson and Ferency's position.

Most delegates, though, were of the opinion that their action would not cost them labor support for any future race for office.

Children Warrant Careful Driving, Say B'ham Police

School bells are ringing again next week, and children once more will be crossing streets laden with automobiles.

Teachers and parents will be telling and instructing children how to cross streets safely. Birmingham police officers are on the alert to see that everything possible is done to prevent a child accident. Drivers are asked to join with police to insure that no accident happens during this period.

Police officers are patrolling residential streets to slow down speeding drivers as most children walk along residential streets on their way to and from school.
