Mental Health Services Name Consultant

The Oakland County Mental Health Services Committee has announced the appointment of Dr. Norman Rosenzweig as temporary consulting psychiatric director.

Dr. Rosenzweig, of Bloomfield Hills, is director of the department of psychiatry at Sinai Hospital, Detroit, and has served on the faculty of Wayne State University department of psychiatry since 1951.

Paul N. Averill, of Birmingham, Mental Health Services Committee chairman, said Dr. Rosenzweig will be consulted during the formation of a county-wide psychiatric aid program, which is supported by state and county funds.

DR. ROSENZWEIG is chairman of the committee on Neuropsychiatric Hospitals and Clinics of the Michigan Society of Neurology and Psychiatry. A Chicago Medical School graduate, Dr. Rosenzweig spent seven years in Ann Arbor, where first he obtained his master's degree in psychiatry at the University of Michigan, and then

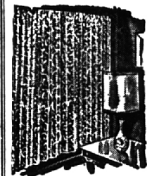

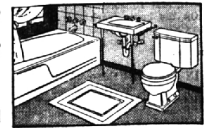
