"I NEVER allowed our children so much attention that I neglected my husband," she says.

Heading Mrs. Sims' rules for the good life is "Talking things over." If either the wife or husband has a habit, or an expression, or anything that annoys the other, then the other says so. And each always tries to reform.

"When a man and wife get to the point where they can't talk freely to each other, trouble begins."

HER SECOND rule is that the wife should retire when the husband does.

"I retired," she says, "because I felt my time should be arranged to match his. I gave up Girl Scout work, twelve years of civic work, all volunteer work on drives in the community, and everything else that kept me from doing things with my husband when he wanted to do them. There was compensation for me in this. I was no longer pinned down. My husband and I were free to come and go as we pleased . . ."

Her third rule is to let her husband be. If he wants to sit and read she lets him do it. Meanwhile she sews, crochets, knits, and does other things around the house she likes to do without his company.

Her fourth rule: let him discover the super-market on his own. "My husband had never been in a super-market until he retired. I never asked him to stop at the store for me. Now he enjoys shopping with me, and I enjoy the delight he shows in the job."

She has learned new things about his favorite meals since he started going to the market.

MRS. SIMS says she takes hikes with her husband, goes for walks in the neighborhood after supper with him. They call on neighbors they feel it best not to disturb in the daytime.

Announce Road Repair Program In Beverly Hills

BEVERLY HILLS — A major street repair program will get under way soon in the village at a cost of \$46,710.75. It has been announced by W. L. Kouba, village road commissioner.

Several original concrete streets constructed back in the mid 20's will be re-surfaced with bituminous asphalt, while other asphalt streets will be excavated where required and new sub-base material will be added and resurfaced.

The cost of the program will be met 50 per cent by revenue received from gas and weight tax funds, received annually from the

state. The other 50 per cent will come from monies raised by the one-mill road repair assessment.

BALANCE OF the gas and weight tax revenue is allocated for general street maintenance which includes top dressing of unpaved streets, grading, minor asphalt patching, minor ditching, repairing and replacing traffic and street signs, striping major roads for traffic control, service and electrical charges for traffic control lights, sanding, salting, sweeping, snow removal on major streets, as well as other miscellaneous maintenance.

The following street locations will have work performed on them in this program:

Belford, between Mayfair and Norchester; Hillcrest, between Warwick and Norchester; Birchwood, between Greenfield and Madison; Buckingham, between Riverside and Southfield; Buckingham, between Madison and Greenfield; Deonshire, between Riverside and Norchester.

Drury, between Riverside and

Warwick; Dunblaine, between Riverside and Southfield; Evergreen, at Rouge River; Nixon, between Southview and Mayfair; Warwick, at Norchester intersection; Sheridan, between Greenfield and Dunblaine; Waltham, between Warwick and Beverly; Warwick, between Waltham and Weston; Chelsea, between Riverside and Warwick.

ROBINHOOD, at Little John; Madoline, between E. Rutland and Pierce; 13 Mile at Wylie Groves School; 13 Mile at Lahser Road

intersection; 13 Mile, between Greenfield and West village limits; and Medford, at Norchester intersection.

Contract was awarded to Detroit Concrete Products, who was low bidder out of six bids received. Johnson & Anderson, Inc., consulting engineers, are the engineers for the project.

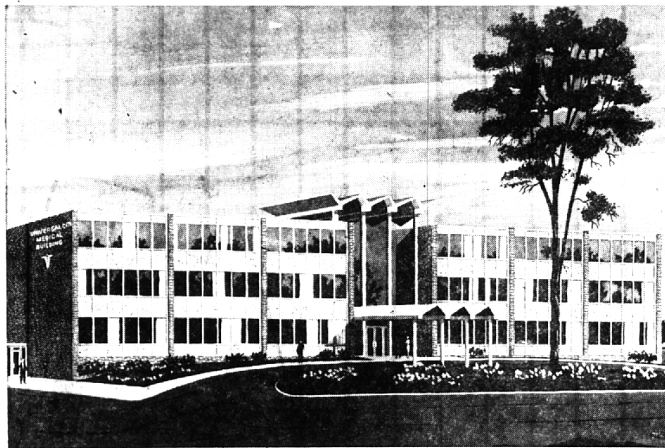
