

Union Strike Vote OK'd at Chrysler

All UAW Chrysler locals have now completed taking their strike vote, it was announced by Douglas Fraser, UAW Executive Board Member-at-large and director of the union's Chrysler Department. The results: 40 locals representing 74,173 UAW members have voted to strike by a margin of 94.3 per cent.

"This near unanimous vote for strike action on the part of Chrysler workers should convince the corporation once and for all that this year, more than ever, they are determined to get their fair share," Fraser said.

"If Chrysler wishes to avoid a strike on Sept. 9, it will have to come up with another and more acceptable offer," Fraser said.

Council OK's Zoning Variance in Bingham

BINGHAM FARMS—The Bingham Farms council last week acted on zoning board of appeals to tentatively approve a request for a variance by Alfred Wile, property owner within 1,000 feet of Wiles' property off Brooks Park will be notified of a public hearing in October.

The variance will allow Wile to build his home on the portion of his property which is in Bingham Farms, though access to it will be from that portion which is in Southfield City. A nominal concession to side-lot restrictions is being considered.

PROPERTY OWNERS will be receiving a council letter explaining in detail the proposition to enter into a contractual agreement with the Baldwin Library for library services on an annual basis. A ballot will be enclosed for return of individual expressions re-

garding the proposal which will cost approximately 1/4 of a mill the first year based on recent library-use surveys. If the use increases, or decreases, fees will be adjusted accordingly each year.

Because bids for the four year road improvement program were regarded as excessively high, the council rejected all five and will postpone the program until next spring. Street commissioner Harold Speicher was authorized to notify the companies who placed bids that they will be invited to resubmit them in early 1965.

CONSEQUENTLY, \$14,000 in the general highway fund will be placed in a certificate of deposit for six months and reserved for spring.

Another \$5,000 of special assessment funds will also be similarly reserved until needed next spring.

Sept. 21 has been scheduled for a public hearing of Step No. 2 of the Evergreen Interceptor project. This step will bring sewer lines up to the village limits at 12 1/2 Mile road but does not provide service. At present Bingham Farms has been paying just for capacity rights to ultimately use the sewer.

Councilman Haskill Wright suggested that Bingham Farms apply for federal funds to help pay for professional planning which will update zoning restrictions. Swiftly changing conditions in the area have put Bingham Farms' existing codes in some legal jeopardy.

The small village faces expensive litigation to defend its 60,000 square-foot zoning. A review and revised master plan by professionals is being considered.

Refresher Class Offered for Area Engineers

Birmingham area engineers who plan to write the Michigan State Registration Examination in January, 1965 can now apply for enrollment in The Engineering Society of Detroit's Fall Term refresher course.

This refresher course is open to all members of The Engineering Society of Detroit and members of its 50 affiliated technical societies. This course has been designed to reinforce and refresh previous backgrounds and provide a comprehensive review of the subjects on which candidates will be examined in January.

These refresher courses have been held continuously since 1946 with total enrollment over the years of 6,092.

REGISTRATION FOR this course will be completed during the first class. Part I for Engineers will be held Sept. 12, beginning at 8 a.m. in the Society's Rooms "EPG".

Part I consists of 23 two-hour sessions covering statics, strength of materials, dynamics, physics, design, fluid mechanics, economics, electricity, thermodynamics and chemistry.

Applications for this course are available at ESD Headquarters, 100 Farnsworth Avenue.

Each year the third classmen train at Camp Buckner, a large tract of rugged, undeveloped mountainous New York terrain,

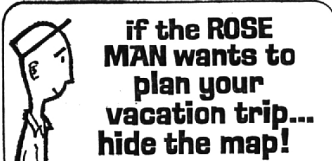

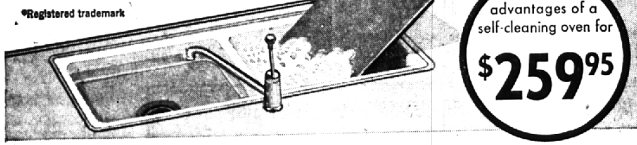
